MAKE NEW SCHOOL DISTRICTS

Members Board of Education Provide for Pupils in Southern Part of City

At the suggestion of Joseph Scott, the board of education called in special session last evening turned over the question of passing on contracts for the heating and ventilating of the polytechnic high school to the building committee, with power to act.

B. F. Hulse, representing the Pacific Machinery and Electric company, and B. H. Cass and A. G. Zimmerla of the Cass Damel Hardware company, which is bidding for the contract, presented the advantages of their particular plan at a meeting of the building committee which followed the board meeting.

The committee decided to submit the plans to a committee of architects. Business which was rushed through included the forming of two new school districts, one to be known as the Micheltoreno school district, to be bounded on the north by the city limits, on the east by Linda Vista street to Reservoir street, south by Reservoir street to Micheltoreno, south of Micheltoreno to Bellevue avenue, west on Bellevue avenue to city limits, and on the west by the city limits.

The other to be known as West Vernon avenue school district, to be bounded on the north by Santa Barbara avenue and Fortieth street to Metta avenue, thence south on Metta avenue to Forty-second street, east on Forty-second street to Main street, on the east by Main street to Forty-eighth street, on the south by Forty-eighth street to the city limits, on the west by city limits.

The resignations of Georgia Suber, Frances Nichols and Ellen Dickison were accepted. Leave of absence was granted to Caroline H. Rogers, from October 30 to November 13; Jessie L. Springer and Edith L. Furrey to June 20, 1906.

MYRON HEIRS CONTEST ORDER

Ruling of Court Appointing Widow Special Executrix is Attacked

The first step in what promises to be a prolonged legal contest between the heirs of the estate of Senator O. H. Myron of Minnesota, who died in Los Angeles Friday, was taken yesterday when the children attempted to have Judge Conroy in department two of the superior court declare null and void the appointment of Katharine Myron, the widow, as special administratrix.

There was considerable trouble between Mrs. Myron and her step-children and when Myron was on his deathbed at the Good Samaritan hospital Friday morning the wife alleges she was denied admittance to his bedside.

She went to court as soon as she learned she had been cut off without a penny and she was appointed special administratrix of the estate of \$10,000. The case was taken under submission yesterday.

TO INVESTIGATE OUTFALL SEWER

MAYOR IS EMPOWERED TO CHOOSE COMMITTEE

Civic Bodies Will Select Men Who Are to Make Thorough Inspection of Work Done on Big Municipal Contract

The impression that the mayor has an idea that all is not well with the outfall sewer was given yesterday when he sent a communication to the council asking that body to give him the authority to appoint a committee of experts to make immediate investigation of the work that has been done.

"Pursuant to numerous requests for an independent inspection of the construction of the outfall sewer that have been received by me I beg to suggest that a committee of experts be appointed to make a thorough investigation and report upon the outfall sewer at this time and also later on if necessary.

"I would respectfully recommend that I be authorized by resolution to appoint a committee of three for this purpose.

"In appointing this committee I will take pleasure in making my selection from names submitted and agreed upon by the civic bodies of this city, taking into consideration only men who are thoroughly reliable and unbiased."

The mayor was given the authority he desired, and the Municipal League, the Merchants' association and chamber of commerce invited to select men for the mayor's committee.

To Discuss the Truth This proposition follows closely on the heels of the investigation of the outfall sewer made by the sewer committee and the mayor last Thursday.

City Engineer Stafford also accompanied the party, and on their return the city engineer and Councilman Hammon, a member of the sewer committee, were enthusiastic in their praise of the work done on the outfall sewer.

In the opinion of the city engineer every specification was being lived up to by the contractors. Chairman Kern of the committee and the mayor have steadily refused to talk about the proposition at all and have refused to affirm or deny the rumors that the work was being improperly done.

Councilman Kern was the first to move that the mayor be given the authority he asked to appoint the committee. When Councilman Kern was asked pointedly yesterday if there was anything wrong with the outfall sewer he answered:

SLOWLY TAKE TESTIMONY

Several Witnesses Give Evidence in Bolsa Bay Land Split Case

Several witnesses for the Anaheim Land, Mining and Development were heard yesterday before A. W. Kinney, receiver, and A. J. Crulckshank, register, of the United States Land office.

The case has been dragging along for three weeks and only about half of the testimony has as yet been heard.

The suit is a three-cornered affair concerning a spit of land, fifty-three acres in extent, situated at Bolsa bay.

It is claimed by the Anaheim Land, Mining and Development under the mining law and declares that it has done the necessary amount of work to hold the land. They say that the spit is rich in gold values and that the sand will assay \$200 to the ton.

J. C. Ord of Bolsa Bay says that script has been issued to him by the United States government for the land and that he wishes to gain possession of the land as soon as possible, as he wishes to plant cabbages, for which he says the land is admirably adapted.

The Alamitos Land company says that the land belongs to them for the reason that they own the land that surrounds it, and it was washed in by the action of the sea.

Testimony in the case will be taken all this week.
