MORLEY'S BILLIARD PARLORS ARE PEELESS... New Resort is to Be Christened Thursday Night With Exhibition Games Between "Chic" Wright and Willie Maguire

Los Angeles is to have the finest billiard parlors in the world after Thursday night, on which date James Morley will throw open to the public the handsome new rooms at 220 South Spring street.

The furnishings of this new resort are of the finest and no expense has been spared to make it just what the proprietor has determined it shall be—without an equal on the face of the globe.

Handsome carpets cover the floor and telephones and call bells are supplied with each table. New table lamps of late design, which removes all chances of shadows upon the tables, are above the tables and these are the first lamps of this pattern to be used on the coast.

The billiard and pool tables are of the finest manufacture, are equipped with the best cushions and are marvels of beauty to gaze upon. Nine billiard tables and sixteen pool tables will be operated in the rooms. Downstairs will be one of the best equipped bowling and tenpin alleys in the west.

This handsome resort will be thrown open Thursday, but tonight it will be open to a party of newspaper friends of the proprietor and the party will be entertained with an exhibition game of billiards between H. A. (Chic) Wright, amateur champion of the Pacific coast, and Willie Maguire, the boy wonder of Napa.

Morley will entertain a party of billiard devotees and their wives with a similar exhibition in private Wednesday night. Wright and Maguire have come from San Francisco as guests of Morley and to lend their presence and aid in opening the new parlors.

Wright is well known among the lovers of the billiard game on the coast, being their champion in amateur ranks and a player of national reputation and recognized ability.

Wright is regarded as the champion amateur billiardist of America, although another holds the title. Wright defeated Sigourney for the coast championship last year at a tournament held with conditions in the national championship contest and lost in the play-off.

Wright's friends assert that the superiority of the Pacific coast champion over Sigourney was so marked in their games that it is believed that Wright would have won the American championship had he contested as he intended, being prevented by the death of his father.

Maguire, who will oppose Wright in exhibition games, is but 19 years old and is regarded for the coast as a prodigy. He has won the Frisco seven months ago was unknown to the billiard world.

With no training and but slight knowledge of the fine points of the game, Maguire entered the class B tournament and in 1000 points was defeated for the championship by thirty-one points. He is regarded as a wonder at billiards and experts who have witnessed his playing regard him as a youth with a great future at the game.

In the exhibition games to be played in Los Angeles Wright will handicap himself, playing 300 points to 150 for Maguire.

Coach Harvey Holmes is jubilant over the trip and when interviewed said "we were entertained royally by the northerners and everything was arranged for our pleasure that we feel disappointed and that was our neglect to bring an umpire from the south."

ASCOT STABLES FILLING RAPIDLY THOROUGHBREDS ARE ARRIVING DAILY

Unprecedented Demand for Accommodations Swamp Management and Season Promises Well

Ascot park is rapidly developing into a very busy place and by tonight the number of horses and horsemen at the track will have been doubled.

The first special train from the east is due to arrive this morning and will bring about two hundred horses from Jamaica. And each day for the last week straggling strings of thoroughbreds have arrived.

The latest string to come in is that of Joseph James, the Canadian horseman, who brought seven from the northeast country yesterday.

James has Luckett, Silver Wedding and Wee Lass and four yearlings. James has the distinction of having developed the unbeaten Descuento, which started seven times and won all of them. The latter defeated Oxford and many other eastern cracks before his untimely death, which occurred at Memphis recently.

Jockeys are also showing up and by the end of the week the Ascot colony will be further increased by the arrival of crack riders from all parts of the country.

Jockey Louis Kunz got in yesterday from Louisville after a successful season in the Canadian tracks. Kunz will have the mounts for the Moor, mead stable which will race at Ascot this winter.

Many New Arrivals C. Reiff was another arrival. Reiff at one time in his career was the premier jockey in America and while racing for Jas. McCafferty in the east in 1887 made a record which stood until last year. During 1896 Reiff rode 292 winners, but he had double the number of mounts as compared with Reiff's successful year.

Reiff owns a ranch in Kansas and had decided to retire from the turf, but the approach of the winter racing season aroused his weakness for the pigskin and he was unable to resist the temptation to get into harness again. He will ride in steeplechase events at Ascot this season.

There are stalls for the accommodation of thousands of horses at Ascot, but Manager Brooks asserts that he has applications for more than this number already on file and each day brings in further applications. He is considering the necessity of enlarging the quarters and increasing the stable room to accommodate the extraordinary number of horses which will be shipped to the local track this winter.

Every day witnesses the arrival of bunches of horses and with those already on the road and already assigned. Manager Brooks has his think cap filled with visions of a S. R. O. sign unless immediate steps are taken to increase the stabling capacity of the track.

The demand for stable room is unprecedented and bears out the predictions made earlier in the year that the winter season on the coast would eclipse all other years in point of number of horses and horsemen in attendance at the meeting.

Vast improvements have been made at the track and the regulars will recognize the difference when the gates are thrown open Thanksgiving day. The summer housecleaning process has worked wonders in brightening the infield and the driveways are banked with fresh earth and everything has been given a new dress all around.

Hal Booker will ship all of his horses to Ascot from Lantonia, and J. Booker and A. W. Booker, the jockeys, brother and brother-in-law, will ride for the stable.

Willie Hennessey, the crack jockey, will be among the riders at Ascot this season, being under contract to Joseph James, whose stable is already at Ascot.

J. L. McGinniss and his stable of good ones will be on the coast this winter, and will race a portion of his string at Ascot. Among his good ones is Chimney Sweep, which he recently acquired.
