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# SHOW INFINITE PATIENCE

## Missionary Says Japanese Wives Make Life a Period of Self Sacrifice

"Poor, patient, long suffering wives of Japan, too often they live a breaking heart under a smiling face and at best they know little of the love and respect which the high society of the American women expect," said Rev. H. B. Schwartz, a returned missionary from Japan, yesterday at the meeting of the Methodist Ministers' association in the First Methodist church.

Self-sacrifice is the keynote of the Japanese wives," continued the speaker. "In them truly patience has had her perfect work. Disciplined from babyhood to the grave, the Japanese women are no butterflies, living mere lives of pleasure such as some people seem to think. For the most part they are the very opposite of that plain, hard-working home bodies with few accomplishments, giving themselves for 365 days of the year to their husbands and families with the same devotion which their brothers have shown upon the battlefield."

"Dad women there are not a few among the Japanese, for bad men will make them, but even among them there are probably a few utterly debased as may be found in occidental lands. They are lotus flowers, the Japanese say, growing in the mud."

"The commercial class of the Japanese people have been considered in years past in the lower scale of social and business life. But within the past ten years this has been greatly overcorrected. As a nation the Japanese compare favorably with any nation in the world."

The meeting was attended by a large number of clergymen and a discussion followed the address of Mr. Schwartz, which was highly complimentary.
