

BLUE HORSE IS MUCH EXPECTED OF SAIS THIS SEASON

Thoroughbred Showing Great Form and Will Be Much in Evidence at Ascot Park—Turf Notes

James Blute has caused the entry of his good one, Sais, to be made in all stake events to be run off at Ascot this season and has great expectations for the thoroughbred.

Sais will be remembered by local racegoers for his splendid races at Ascot at the last two meetings, when he annexed several purses and stakes, and for his excellent record on eastern tracks where he has maintained his record in races against the best thoroughbred speeders of the country.

Sais is showing nicely this early and Blute is building great hopes of annexing many important stakes and purses with him during the winter season. His pre-season workouts are entirely satisfactory and it is expected that he will show equally as good form as in his 3-year-old campaign. Should he do this it is good-by for all other contenders to all stakes in which he participates.

Blute has an excellent string at Ascot, having brought twenty-three horses from the east recently, and all of them are in fine fettle for the season. The Blute string is in two divisions, his son Alfred having charge of one division, both of which will be raced at Ascot.

In his day the elder Blute was the premier jockey in Ireland and achieved fame as a rider of steeplechasers. He is also one of the best known and most capable trainers of thoroughbreds in the business and his success on the turf has been the result of his own efforts and handling of his horses.

Jockey Wilkerson, a promising lightweight rider, accompanies the stable and is much in demand as exercise boy since his arrival at Ascot. Wilkerson will have the leg on all apprentice mounts for the Blute stable.

Barney Schrieber, who has a large number of good ones at Oakland and a string of twenty at Ascot, will arrive today with ten of the Oakland string to be raced at Ascot.

The plungers and pickers took another rap at the bookies yesterday when they being run at Oakland. This one was a hot tip and at fair prices in the first betting and was heavily played.

George Durker, who developed Father Catchem, is conducting a public training stable in connection with his own string. He has interlude and several other speedy ones in his string, as well as several horses belonging to others which he is training.

Montana Peeres at Oakland was the disappointment of the day for the Tuesday pickers. This race carried more money, principally wagered on Montana Peeres, than any other that has played locally. The book was not ripe enough and failed to even peep.

Despite the fact that the Emeryville meeting is not yet well under way and the track is not yet in fast time, Starter Jake Holtman is also adding to the success of the meeting by getting the horses away from the post with remarkable ability even for Holtman.

Lloyd Nicol, a stable employe of J. Millard, sustained a fracture of the collarbone yesterday in an accident on the track. He was exercising Sheriff Bell and going at a fair clip when the horse stumbled near the eighth pole, causing Nicol to be thrown and to fall about his mouth in the fall.

With opening day slightly more than two weeks in the future, the local track is assuming a busy scene with the morning trials for the 500 runners at the track and the activities of the small army of trainers, owners, jockeys and employes. After business hours the local baseball games at the Coliseum and every form of athletic pastime is indulged.

Johnny Millin sent a telegram to his friend Pat Tulzger yesterday in which was given the advice to play the Millin entry in the fourth and fifth races at Oakland. Akela in the fourth and Princess Titania in the fifth were the entries and each brought up first under the wire and at good odds. Tulzger's friends profited by the tip.

The Bonaack stable possesses an indescribable charm for the local players, and the temptation to play the entries regardless of the class of other horses in the race is too great to be resisted. High Chancellor and Judge Denton started the ball on Monday and their success caused a heavy play yesterday on Del Coronado, which was played out of the boards and got only the peep portion of the purse.
