PRODUCE MEN HOLD BANQUET

HUNDRED MEN GATHER AT FESTIVAL BOARD

Fortune Teller Enjoy Feast of Reason and Flow of Soul—Speeches Are Both Wise and Witty

Unity of action and complete commercial fellowship was illustrated at the fourth semi-annual banquet of the Los Angeles Produce exchange served in the real room of the hotel last night. Covers were laid for one hundred members and nearly every seat was occupied. The gathering marked the formal opening of the new offices of the exchange in the new building recently erected at the junction of Central and Towne avenues, where in future there will be daily calls down the line in every feature of the produce market, under the direction of President Lewis and Secretary J. Mills Davies. The banquet was "one of the finest and was served with all the honors and in the most magnificent manner noted and with musical accompaniment provided by Jay B. Jacobs, chairman of the committee of arrangements. The toastmaster was the eloquent and witty member of the exchange, C. W. Thompson, who proved himself a pastmaster in the art of meeting all conditions that were thrust unexpectedly upon him by the array of spellbinders.

Drainage Causes Depression

The water percolating south of Barton vs. the Riverside Water company, on trial here, developed a new phase of business depression resulting from the drainage of this valley by the Riverside company, Frank Macchem, who drilled scores of wells over the valley for ranchers, testified that with the drainage of the basin his business ceased and the ranchers could no longer secure water at ordinary depths. His business practically ceased in that line soon after 1893, and the water level since that time had been gradually falling, so that wells were now a very expensive proposition, as they had to be bored to the lower levels to secure water, and even then the flow was not what it should be.

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WOMAN MANGLED BY ELECTRIC CAR

VICTIM OF ACCIDENT WAS 70 YEARS OF AGE

Mrs. Margaret Underhill Instantly Killed by Long Beach Electric Coach Near Watts Yesterday Afternoon

Mrs. Margaret Underhill, aged 70 years, while crossing the Pacific Electric company's tracks at Watts about 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon was struck by a Long Beach car and instantly killed.

Mrs. Underhill was thrown under the wheels and horribly mangled. The Breese Brothers' ambulance responded to the call. Investigation at Watts station developed that the woman has been living alone in a cottage at Elcote, a station near Watts. She has a sister named Lizzie Stork living in San Francisco, and two grandsons, Roy and Spencer Stork, living in Los Angeles.

What prompted the woman to step in front of the rapidly approaching car is not known. The car was bound for the city. When about one-half mile south of Watts station, the motorman began blowing the whistle, say the car men. Possible deafness on the part of the aged woman is the only cause for the accident entertained by Coroner Trout. An inquest will be held this afternoon at 5 o'clock.
