#### BEGINS TRAINING AT SANTA MONICA

Tommy Burns Also Starts Work to Reduce Weight, Hoping to Be Matched With the Winner

Mike Schreck arrived in Los Angeles yesterday morning and immediately afterward left for North Beach, Santa Monica, to begin training for his twenty-round bout with Jack Twin Sullivan, which occurs November 23.

Schreck appeared to be in good condition and says that he has been training for several days in Chicago in anticipation of getting on with Twin.

With more than a week in which to get in tip-top trim, Schreck will not experience much difficulty in making the weight and yet be in good condition to put up the best fight there is in him.

Jack Twin will train at San Rafael with his brother Mike, who is preparing for his fight with Jimmy Gardner on November 24. Jack will come to Los Angeles Sunday night and will be ready to step into the ring when he arrives.

Tommy Burns began training yesterday in a light manner to get into condition and stow away some of the surplus flesh which he has been tottering around since his scrap with Jack Twin.
