LOST THEIR LIVES IN WRECK OF STEAMER HILDA

More Than Sixty Bodies Have Been Cast Up on French Coast, Including That of Captain of the Vessel

LONDON, Nov. 26.—One hundred and twenty-eight persons lost their lives in the wreck of the London & South-western railway company's steamer Hilda off the northern coast of France Saturday night, according to an official estimate given out tonight by the company. This roll includes twenty-one saloon passengers, eighty Frenchmen and the remainder the crew.

BODIES WASHED ASHORE

More Than Sixty Corpses Have Been Found on Coast. ST. MALO, France, Nov. 26.—Realization of the full extent of the disaster to the people of St. Malo, as reports of the finding of bodies were received from different points along the coast. In all over sixty bodies have been washed up, including that of Capt. Gregory, the commander of the wrecked ship, which now lies in the hospital here, and as fast as other bodies arrive they will be placed in a room prepared for their reception.

Thirteen bodies of saloon passengers have been identified. These are Mrs. Rook, her two children and their governess; Dr. Stanley, his wife and two daughters and a maid; Maj. and Mrs. Price, Mr. Wellesley and Mr. Grindle. The survivors are rapidly recovering. James Gunter, the only seaman saved from the wreck, says there was no panic on board. Attempts were made to lower the boats but the rough sea rendered it impossible. Gunter clung to the fittings of the topmast with nine others below him, including the chief mate and three Bretons, who died during the night of exposure. The Hilda struck at 10 o'clock Monday night. She was going very slowly at the time. Rockets were sent up, but there was no response. Seven minutes later the ship broke amidships and her decks were swept bare with the exception of the few survivors who clung to the mast. They were rescued by the steamer Ada at 3 o'clock Monday morning, having endured twelve hours of agony.

CAPTAIN MISTOOK LIGHT

Thought Buoy of the Rocks Was St. Malo Beacon

PARIS, Nov. 26.—Special reports received here of the wreck of the steamer Hilda, which left Southampton Friday night for St. Malo, France, and was totally wrecked on the Les Fortes reef, outside Jardin lighthouse, Saturday night, with the loss of over 100 lives, give a graphic description of the disaster. Owing to the rough sea, together with a thick snow storm, the captain of the Hilda probably took the buoy light of the rocks for the St. Malo lighthouse. He gave signals which were not seen by harbor employees and then the steamer proceeded slowly toward the light. When the Hilda struck the rocks the steamer's boilers exploded and she was cut in two, giving the passengers no time to save their lives. Seven bodies wearing life belts were stranded off the village of St. Cast. The coast near St. Malo is covered with wreckage and some cattle.

Two-thirds of the Hilda's passengers were French farmers returning to France with heavy sums of gold for the yearly harvest of potatoes. Others were English families who were going to spend the winter at Dinard. The wreck lies on the beach three miles off St. Malo, showing only her mainmast and foremast.

A correspondent of the Matin went to the scene of the wreck on a government steamer with the local officials. They picked up five bodies which were entangled in the rigging of the Hilda. The bodies presented a dreadful spectacle, with arms and legs twisted in all directions and hands torn with desperate struggling.

MAGNESITE IN CALIFORNIA

This is the Only State in the Union Where This Mineral is Produced

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—California is the only state, according to a report just issued by the geological survey, that produces magnesite, which is a native magnesium carbonate composed of 47.6 per cent magnesite and 52.4 per cent carbon dioxide. During 1904 the quantity of crude magnesite produced was 2850 tons, valued at \$2929. For 1903 the quantity reported was 374 short tons, valued at \$10,335, equivalent to 1361 tons calcined, worth \$20,515. The demand for both crude and calcined magnesite on the Pacific coast is limited and prohibitive freight rates have thus far prevented shipments to the east. Oregon and California consume the entire native production. Other states are dependent on imported magnesite.

EXPLAINS CAUSE OF HIGH WINDS

LOW NEVADA AREA MAKES DISTURBANCE

Weather Observer Franklin Discourses Learnedly on Conditions Along Pacific Coast—Promises More Wind or Rain

The velocity of the wind which swept the Los Angeles district yesterday ranged from twelve to twenty-three miles an hour. Observer Franklin explained the disturbance as due to a low area in Nevada.

The high wind which prevailed in Southern California yesterday was due to a low area in southwestern Nevada, said Mr. Franklin. "There was a difference of 40 of an inch in the areas in Southern California and in Nevada," continued the weather observer. "As the air rushes to the low levels from the high the strong winds which have been sweeping Los Angeles yesterday and today are caused."

"Conditions are very unsettled and there is a likelihood of either a rain storm or a continuation of the windy period. There has been much rain in the North Pacific section but the southern section has not had any precipitation since the last storm which occurred last week."

"The storm which appeared off the Washington coast Saturday evening has moved to the southeast and was central Monday morning in Southern Nevada and Western Utah. Rain has fallen generally in Washington and Oregon, turning to snow in the mountains. Snow is falling at Winnemucca and Pocatello, consequent upon the passage of the storm area, but south of the divide no rain has fallen with the exception of Los Angeles, where a light sprinkling was observed yesterday morning."

"A slight frost is scheduled for the interior this morning and snow will probably fall on the higher levels."

Minneapolis Leaves Cherboung CHERBOURG, Nov. 26.—The United States cruiser Minneapolis sailed from here today, a furious storm having delayed her earlier departure.


