NEW STRUCTURE WILL COST \$25,000

Rev. G. E. Foster, the Pastor, Was Only Boy to Come on First Railway Train to California

The present Newman Methodist church on Towne avenue, near Seventh street, will soon be a thing of the past and the new church property will be a credit to the church and congregation.

The old church on Towne avenue has become inadequate for the increasing congregation. It is proposed to dispose of this property and turn the proceeds toward the new lot and building, which will be at the corner of Ruth and Agatha streets.

The church has a fine orchestra of fifteen pieces, under the leadership of Rudolph Metz. The pastor and his entire family are musicians and artists.

In briefly speaking of his life, Rev. Mr. Foster said yesterday: "I have the honor of being the first and only boy who came on the first train into California. It was in 1869, and I was 7 years old. I came with my parents from Illinois, arriving at Santa Barbara. I attended the University of Southern California in its early history."

INSANE MUSICIAN OFFERS TO SING FOR INSANITY BOARD

ONCE GREAT VOCALIST IS SENT TO ASYLUM

Prof. Julian O. Schultz, Member of New York Conservatory, Loses Mind Since Coming to California

With eyes flashing and hands gesticulating wildly, Prof. Julian O. Schultz, one of America's foremost vocalists, yesterday attempted to explain to the insanity commission in Judge Conroy's department of the superior court, a way in which he would finance the Owens river proposition and make Los Angeles one of the greatest cities on the face of the earth.

It was pitiful to watch the old man as he sat before his examiners and talked of the things he expected to do, of his old triumphs and of the many honors heaped upon him.

For some time past it was rumored that Schultz was former court musician to the court of Emperor William, but the old man indignantly denied the statement yesterday.

"I left Germany when I was about twenty years of age, I am now sixty-four. It happened in this way. I was a member of one of the foremost houses of Prussia and my relatives are now in office there, cousin George von Reimach being secretary of finances of the kingdom of Prussia."

FOR GREATER LOS ANGELES IS COMMITTEE'S WATCHWORD

The next step for a "Greater Los Angeles" will be taken Friday afternoon when members of the committee having the proposition in charge will meet at the Chamber of Commerce to talk over the case and develop their plans.

Again the old man interrupted as he leaned over the desk before him and talked earnestly to his judges. "I have the voice," he said, "if you gentlemen could just hear my voice for a minute I would convince you that I am all right."

The musician was taken away and as he went he muttered, "I don't like this, I don't like it. I think those people are going to do something wrong to me." He was later told of the order of the court to commit him to Patton asylum on the insanity charge and he wept bitterly.
