

SPACE RASHED
HAZEL PATCH WINS TWO IN THREE HEATS

Zolock Scores in Initial Contest, but is Beaten in the Other Two, the Race Being Continued to Today

Patriotism was intensely exhibited by the thousands on the grounds and in the grandstand at Agricultural park yesterday afternoon during the contests between the coast prize, Zolock, and his eastern rival, Hazel Patch, and for the time every person inside the gates was a native son or daughter.

The largest crowd of the meeting was in attendance, and although all the events were of exceptionally high class and the contests were thrillingly exciting throughout, the general interest was centered in the special \$1000 match race between the two stallions. It was trainer Delaney who drove Zolock past the grandstand to the post the crowd broke into an enthusiastic applause, which continued until Delaney lifted his red cap in acknowledgment of the expression of encouragement. And as an expression of admiration for the worthy rival of the coast stallion, the crowd was equally as pronounced in the greeting extended Hazel Patch and his owner-driver, J. W. Flack.

Get Away Evenly
Starter A. W. Bruner invariably got the pacers away evenly and the results were not obtained through any advantage on this score.

Zolock won the first heat in a drive that began at the head of the stretch and extended to the imaginary wire in front of the judges' stand, forcing patch and finishing point three-quarters of a length to the good.

This heat was the prettiest of the three contests and from the start to the finish the crowd was upon its feet, yelling encouragement to the pacer ahead and shouting calls to greater efforts as the stallions thundered down the stretch on almost even terms.

As they passed the finishing line with the California pacer nearly a length ahead the spectators on the grandstand and the scene of flying hats, umbrellas and canes was indescribable.

Partisans of Hazel Patch had their innings in the succeeding heats in which the Kentucky pacer easily won from Zolock. The second heat was nip and tuck all the way around until well into the stretch, when Patch drew away from Zolock and won by two lengths.

The third heat was the easiest win for Patch. After passing the quarter pole Flack sent Patch to the front and when he reached the three-quarter pole Patch was fully a length ahead and going easily. Delaney sent Zolock after the flying Patch at this point, and although the lead was too great to be overcome, lessened the distance between the pacers to two lengths at the finish.

The race was continued until 1 o'clock today, as the national association rules prohibit the start of another heat after sundown, and the third heat was not finished until 6 o'clock yesterday.

They will go to the post today promptly at the hour, and with the overnight rest it is believed that Zolock will be in condition to run back to his form in the first heat, which was the fastest of the three contests.

Good Races on Card
Although the match race was the feature event of the day, three other equally as interesting and exciting races were on the card.

The first event of the day was the deciding heat in the unfinished 2:20 pace from Wednesday. Five of the original contenders went to the post and but one heat was required to decide the race.

Welcome Me, which ran a dead heat with Birdal in the second contest Wednesday, and experienced every phase of hard luck in the race, as fresh as a daisy yesterday and easily took first place and the race.

Four of the contenders were bunched at intervals of less than a length apart, while Henry was trailing a length behind the other four at the finish.

The second race brought together four candidates for honors in the 2:14 trot, and five heats were required to decide the race. Morone was made favorite by the spectators and finished the first two heats in driving finishes with Cuete.

Cuete got in the game thereafter and took the remaining three heats from Morone, the two always finishing close together and nicely in front of the others.

The 2:12 pace was the most stubbornly contested of all the events and after four heats were paced without showing a winner the race was continued until 1 o'clock today and the fifth heat will be paced immediately after the Zolock-Hazel Patch duel.

Oma A was installed favorite in the pace, but was a false choice, as she never finished better than fourth. Glenn, which was second choice, took the first heat in a whisker finish with Abula.

Abula took to heart this defeat by so many a man, and in the next heat refused to run kindly and finished sixth. In the third heat the bay gelding gave up the ghost and was disqualified.

Glenn came back in the third heat and outfinished Vinnie Mann by a slight margin, and finished second in the fourth heat.

The card for today is equally as attractive as that offered yesterday. It includes the deciding heat of the Zolock-Hazel Patch match race, the deciding heat of the unfinished 2:12 pace from yesterday, 2:24 class trotting, 2:27 class pacing and 2:25 class pace for matinee cup.

The card for Saturday will be especially attractive. A match race between Hazel Patch, Zolock and Dedalus, which will be a free-for-all pace at a mile for \$1000, will be the feature event, although another great contest will be that in which John Caldwell with a record of 2:09 and Helen Mark, whose record is 2:09 1/4, will be among the contenders.

The attendance yesterday broke the record for the meeting, it being estimated that fully 5000 persons witnessed the day's contests. The grandstand was crowded, several hundred persons witnessed the contests from carriages, and automobiles on the infield and the crowd which lingered on the ground beneath the grandstand was equally as great as that seated above. Coach Roesch was manager and chief second for the Ayers and Youngs. Demens acted in the same capacity for Mitchell. Roesch and Demens were about to fight the preliminary to the main event when the "Dunkhorst" boy arose and asked that the big bout be postponed until next Tuesday night, as the practice had worn blisters on his feet.

Those who were in on the deal could no longer contain themselves and the gathering which had been completely "taken in" raved away without work into the twilight. Ayers sadly gathered up his fighting paraphernalia and offered them to the lowest bidder.

"Don't work so hard, Stam," said Arden Day, the man who marks the chalk lines and runs the small boy off the fences on the day of the big games during the regular practice. "Let Walker tire himself out."

It was mainly for Day's benefit that yesterday's burlesque was carried out, as some time back Day dropped a remark that something should be doing in the way of excitement after the slightly practice. "There be something doing when Walker and I get together," remarked Mitchell. The remainder of the team members impressed the fact upon Day that a regulation prize contest was on, and after that there was no rest in Day's mind.

A high pitch of excitement and was ever casting pitying glances at Mitchell, who a few moments later was to meet the gigantic Walker.

When asked to prepare a suitable Arden got hold of an ax and began chopping down the supports that flanked the mid of the club house floor. The proceeding promised to be detrimental to the stability of the training quarters and a new place was sought.
