DEATH CLAIMS VICTIM BEFORE OFFICER ARRIVES WITH WRIT

WOMAN'S BODY LEANS AGAINST DOOR

Constable Forces Way Into Fashionable Apartment in Westlake District, to Find Grim Reaper Had Served Attachment

Braced against a door in a sitting posture, the lifeless body of a woman known as Mrs. L. N. Ruch was found by Deputy Constable J. D. Adams in a bedroom at the front of an upstairs flat at 1902 West Sixth street yesterday afternoon.

After forcing the rear door of the apartment the officer, who was there to serve an attachment, discovered that one room was closed. Upon trying the door he found that it was held shut by a weight within and with an effort gained entrance.

For a few seconds Adams was struck dumb by the sight that he beheld. Before him lay the prostrate form of the woman, her face swollen and purple and her arms folded composedly across her breast. The officer hastened to the telephone and notified the police.

Had Been Twice Divorced

A dispatch from Davenport, Ia., explains that the dead woman, whose maiden name was Hansen, was formerly Mrs. Ruch, having married L. K. Ruch, an employe of a malting company in that city, about fifteen years ago. The woman was divorced from Ruch and married a man named Arnold, but was again divorced a few months after the marriage. The woman's next matrimonial venture was when she married a railroad man named King, who recently died at some point in the west.

Was a Handsome Woman

Mrs. C. W. King came to Los Angeles from Minneapolis during the latter part of August and went to the Hollenbeck hotel. The woman came in contact with a number of residents of the Westlake district. Shortly after her arrival, Mrs. King made known that her husband was connected with the Davenport (Ia.) Malt and Brewing company, and had recently fallen heir to \$60,000.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 24.—Mrs. L. K. Ruch lived in St. Paul for eight years with her husband, who was general manager of the St. Paul Packing and Provision company.

Their married life here is said to have been unhappy and they left for Davenport, Iowa, about ten years ago. She left for California last August. Her daughter, Claire Ruch, is about 18 years of age and has lived with her aunt since babyhood. The aunt, Mrs. William B. Floyd, is a half sister of Mrs. Ruch. The daughter is treasurer of the Good Luck branch Sunshine society and is prominent socially. She was unaware of her mother's death until The Herald correspondent called at the aunt's home at midnight. There is a little boy, John, at Davenport, Iowa, where the father lives and is said to be still connected with a brewing company.

Second, That the aid and co-operation of the Church Federation of Los Angeles be solicited in this onslaught, and that said federation be requested to appoint a committee of three, which, with a similar committee from this organization, shall outline a practical campaign against the Ascot park evils.

ENGINEERS' PAY RAISED

Santa Fe Grants Increase on the Albuquerque-El Paso Division

By Associated Press. TOPEKA, Kas., Nov. 24.—The Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe system proper, through J. E. Hurley, general manager, has allowed the locomotive passenger engineers on the division between Albuquerque and El Paso an increase in wages. Their pay heretofore has been \$3.65 and \$3.37 per hundred miles, according to the class of engines handled. The new rates are \$2.75 and \$3.90, being the same as on the division between La Junta and Eaton.

Engineers, except those in passenger service, are relieved from filling grease cups. A demand for the increase of pay for freight engineers on the New Mexican division was rejected by General Manager Hurley. This is the result of a two days' conference between the members of the locomotive engineers grievance committee and Mr. Hurley.
