The fact of the matter is that all hope has been abandoned and any sort of a game for the Saturday preceding the tournament is clearly out of the question. President E. D. Neff said tonight that he has received a letter from Manager Baird of the Michigan athletic department stating that a game have been arranged with either Berkeley or Stanford the big scoring machine which Coach Yost has built up during the past four years at Michigan would gladly have come to the Pacific coast for the purpose, but that any other game could not be considered. Michigan has one of the strongest teams this year in all its history of strong teams and closes the season on Thanksgiving day with a game with the Chicago university eleven and will break training at once. The tournament management regrets exceedingly its evident inability to offer its friends a big football game, but is sure of one thing and that is this year's tournament is going to be a "hummer."

Armed with field glasses, lariats and rifles, Detectives McNamara, Ritch, Talamantes, Rico and Kelley are scouring the foothills surrounding the county near Hollywood searching for a prize Jersey cow answering to the name of "Maud," stolen from J. Leenhouts early Sunday morning in the vicinity of the Bimini baths.

The detectives fear they are going to have desperate cattle thieves to deal with and are armed to the teeth. The sleuths trailed the animal to the entrance to Laurel canyon and from there in a condition of the tracks have formed the theory that the thieves rode the cow away bareback, as after leaving the city there are no tracks visible other than those of the missing bovine.

The theory that "Maud" was ridden away is also based upon the fact that up to within a few blocks of the city limits the tracks of two men have been trailed. At that point the foot prints suddenly leave the earth, but those of "Maud" are strongly marked north from the city across the immense bean fields south of Hollywood and some distance up Laurel canyon, where they entirely disappear in the shrubbery and rocks.

Leenhouts, owner of the prize beauty, declares that the animal was next to human. At critical moments in its life it had displayed intelligence next only to the human mind. The fact that the cow had left her own green pastures at a time when its health was on the decline and sought the beneficial effects of the Bimini baths, which, owing to a recent fire, are open to visits from cattle as well as man, was proof enough of this.

For many days previous to the final departure of the educated cow the animal had shown signs of ill health. The owner, knowing the beneficial effects of the Bimini baths, near his residence, and taking advantage that the recent fire had made the charge of gate fees an impossibility, left the bars to "Maud's" pasture down. That animal had at once taken the hint and sought the mineral water cure.

"Maud," like many other followers of the mineral water cure, would rise at unseemly hours of the night and stroll down to the pool. Leenhouts was on several occasions awakened by his prize animal, but when he learned of its movements would dismiss worry from his mind and resume sleep.

Between the hours of 2 o'clock and 3 o'clock Sunday morning Leenhouts heard a commotion in the pasture occupied by "Maud." The owner of the cow arose and looked out into the darkness, but on being greeted by the gentle call of "Maud" he immediately decided that she was arising to take an early plunge and returned to bed.

Several hours later when the rest of the members of his family arose the news of "Maud's" disappearance was quickly brought to him. A hasty visit to the Bimini baths convinced the owner that "Maud" had not been there that morning. Leaving out of the pasture were trails of two men and another trail which was immediately identified as that of "Maud." This was followed for several blocks. Believing that it would lead to the residence of the thief, Leenhouts called in the assistance of the police.

At a late hour last night a relief squad was sent out to take up the hunt for the missing cow. It is believed that the cattle thieves will be captured within the next few hours.
