

# SEEK IDENTITY OF PRISONER

## TENNESSEE MAN CALLS AT CITY JAIL

### Police Believe Frank McDonald, Who Was Shot by Detective Roberts During Running Fight, Has Criminal Record

Frank McDonald, who was shot last Sunday afternoon by Detective Roberts while trying to evade arrest, was not fully identified yesterday as G. M. Walk, the fugitive murderer of S. Houston Childress of Bristol, Tenn., February 7, 1903, though C. J. St. John, former mayor of Bristol, who is at present a visitor in this city, is inclined to think the wounded man is Walk.

Former Mayor St. John, on reading the description of McDonald in the papers and that the man was suspected of being the murderer of Childress, at once called at the police station and was given an interview with the prisoner.

To Chief of Police Walter H. Aubie, Mr. St. John stated that McDonald resembled the fugitive, G. M. Walk, in every particular except in his voice. Walk's voice was distinctly southern, while that of McDonald is anything but southern.

Several Bristol residents are expected in this city during the week, and an effort will be made to decide positively as to the prisoner's guilt or innocence.

### Worked as Motorman

It was discovered yesterday that McDonald roomed in the Flatiron building at the junction of South Main street and South Broadway. The baggage belonging to the prisoner was at once removed to the detectives' headquarters. No valuable information was obtained by searching the man's property.

It was also learned yesterday that McDonald was recently employed as a motorman by the Pacific Electric Railway company, and made runs out of the city over the Pasadena lines. To the Pacific Electric company he was known as Charles Burt.

The police and detectives are firm in their belief that McDonald has committed a crime at some time in his life. These theories are based principally upon the prisoner's own attitude when questioned and by the discovery of his alleged aliases.

McDonald was dismissed from the receiving hospital and given a cell in the city prison yesterday morning. Since being shot last Sunday he has improved rapidly, and will be given a preliminary hearing in the near future, at which he will be arraigned on the charge of burglary. McDonald also is requested to explain his action of last Sunday afternoon.

### RIVAL FIRE DEPARTMENTS

#### Village Has Two Forces, Each Claiming to Be the Authorized One

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—If a fire should break out in Glencoe, a suburb of Chicago, the question of supremacy of two rival factions, each claiming to be the authorized fire department of the village, would have to be decided before the fire could be put out.

The old fire department organization has been in existence for ten years. A new one was formed recently, but the "old timers" refuse to be displaced and declare they will "get to" the fire apparatus in case of fire. The new appointees say the members of the old department are incompetent and that the new appointees, by virtue of their permit from the village board, have the sole right to fight fires in Glencoe.

By the system in Glencoe, each member of the department is notified by telephone of the fire by the operator at the Glencoe exchange when the alarm has been received. Each organization has posted a list of its members with their telephone numbers at the office and has given the operators orders not to call up the other department in case of fire.

### PRISONER WAS THRIFTY

#### Saved Tips and Bought Stock in a Corporation in the Penitentiary

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Nov. 28.—Governor Folk is greatly incensed to learn that James Hale, a federal prisoner who was removed to Fort Leavenworth prison last Friday, is a stockholder in the Central Broom Manufacturing company, a corporation doing business in the penitentiary. The stock was bought by Hale about two weeks before he was removed to Fort Leavenworth with money he had carefully accumulated by hoarding "tips" that were given him as a prison barber. Hale was sentenced by the federal court of Indian Territory to ninety-nine years for murder and has served six years.

### STANDARD OIL CASE DEFERRED

#### Suit to Oust Company From Missouri Postponed Until January 2

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Nov. 28.—Attorney General Hadley today consented to the postponement of the hearing of the suit of the state of Missouri against the Standard Oil company in New York until Jan. 2, 1906, at the request of attorneys for the defense, who assert that delays now being asked in the case will bring it up for hearing during the holidays. This suit is in connection with the efforts of the attorney general to oust the alleged combine of oil companies from doing business in Missouri.

### BISHOP SAILS FOR HOME

#### Rt. Rev. Mr. Conaty, Accompanied by Other Angelenos, Leaves Paris

Rt. Rev. Bishop Conaty, accompanied by his brother, Rev. Bernard Conaty of Worcester, Mass.; Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Kays and Mrs. W. K. Hampton, sailed yesterday from Paris. Rev. J. J. Clifford, who accompanied Bishop Conaty, has gone to Ireland to visit relatives. It is expected Bishop Conaty will arrive in Los Angeles about December 23.

A committee has been appointed to arrange for a public reception in honor of the homecoming of the bishop. Dr. P. G. Colter is chairman of the committee.

### REVOKES FIVE LICENSES

#### Police Commission Say Billiard Hall Proprietors Have Permitted Much Gambling

Twenty-two special officers' stars were taken away at the meeting of the police commission held yesterday afternoon. It was shown that in the instance of A. A. Fannister, the star had been used to collect debts and as the commissioners hold that the purpose of the police force is not to act as a collection agency, his star was taken away.

At the order of the police commission several billiard hall licenses have been taken away for the reason that the proprietors permitted poker and seven-up to be played for money in their establishments.

The licenses of the following list of pool rooms were revoked by order of the commission: G. W. Perdu, 1232 East Seventh street, J. C. Marchena, 620 East Fifth street, J. Field & Son, 647 Central avenue, J. Field, 631 Central avenue, Decker & Horner, 720 East Ninth street.

A restaurant liquor license was granted to Paul Kerkow. This was the only application that was granted.

The hearing of Patrolmen Dales and Ross was postponed until next Tuesday, when evidence against them will be given by Sergeants Hopp and Butler.

Action was deferred on all applications for pool and billiard hall licenses until an opinion has been given by the city attorney as to the legal right of the city to refuse to grant these licenses without showing cause for such action.

### BUYS SOME RARE VIOLINS

#### R. H. Holmes Purchases for \$40,000 Big Stock Exhibited at the Angelus Hotel

One of the biggest deals in rare musical instruments has just been closed in this city. R. H. Holmes of the small goods department of the Fitzgerald Music company has bought the collection of rare violins recently exhibited at the Angelus hotel by Kohler & Chase, the big San Francisco firm. The price named is \$40,000. The collection also includes bows of the famous masters and a number of rare cellos.

One of the violins has already been sold. Louis Roeder, a Los Angeles druggist, has purchased a rare instrument for \$6000. Other sales are being negotiated.


