SAYS ELLIOWSHIP IS ALL IN THE FUTURE OF CITIES

PROF. ZUEBLIN TALKS ON THE FUTURE OF CITIES

Predicts Great Future for Los Angeles and Declares the Present is Time for Telling

Prof. Zueblin predicted a great future for Los Angeles and a great growth in every direction, and urged his listeners to put forth their best efforts to lay out the city of the future so that it would be prepared to take care of the great mass of poor people who must in time come to every large city as they have to the cities in the past.

"Fellowship is, after all, the only thing we live for," said Prof. Charles Zueblin of Chicago university last night in the second of the series of lectures that he is giving at the Symphony hall, and this in reality sums up his entire address.

The hall was well filled and the audience appreciated a lecture on civics which could have been delivered only by a man who has made an exhaustive study of the subject which he undertook to discuss.

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"Ignorance," in saying Prof. Zueblin "rather than dishonesty, is the cause of much bad government. It is always the illiterate or the new immigrant who is ignorant, but it too frequently extends to those who govern the city."

Good Citizens Do Vote

"We frequently hear the expression to the effect that a certain election would have turned out differently if the good citizens had voted. The good citizens are the ones who do vote. We have also come to the conclusion that citizenship is not only expressed on election day but is expressed 365 days in the year and sometimes 366 days.

"There are two things in the large city we must consider and they are congestion and industrial dependence." Prof. Zueblin then went on to say that the crowded quarters in this country are worse than they are in London, which is much talked of as a city of congested living.

Regarding industrial dependence he stated that all seem to be dependent upon one man and that man is John D. Rockefeller. In treating this part of his subject he took the stand that is taken more or less by the Socialists today and stated that the people as a whole should be educated and taught to be dependent but dependent upon each other instead of the great mass dependent upon a few men.
