

GERMANY EXCITES ANGER OF BRAZIL

MEN FROM GUNBOAT SEIZE ALLEGED DESERTER

Officers of Panther Go Ashore in Civilian Dress and Capture the Fugitive—Official Protest is Made

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—The Brazilian embassy in this city has received a telegram from Baron De Rio Branco, minister of foreign affairs, stating that a few days ago several of the officers of the German gunboat Panther went ashore in civilian dress and visited a small fishing town called Itajaby, in the state of Santa Catalina, and there, without any form of process, seized a man by the name of Steinhoff, who had left his native country, Germany, as a deserter from the army, and took him with them as a prisoner on the Panther.

CRUISERS TO GO SOUTH

Order Believed to Be Result of the Panther Incident

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—A cable dispatch to The Herald from Rio Janeiro, Brazil, says: The cruisers Almirante Barroso, Tamandare and Benjamin Constant have received orders to go south. It is believed their mission is connected with the Panther incident of the forcible seizure of a German deserter by officers from that vessel.

TO CONTROL THE C. H. & D.

Syndicate Formed by J. P. Morgan & Company to Take Over the Stock. NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—The World tomorrow will say: "J. P. Morgan & Co. have formed a syndicate consisting of Mr. Morgan, Norman B. Ream, representing the Pennsylvania, Erie and other allied railroad interests; H. McK. Twombly, representing the Vanderbilt interests, and George F. Baker, representing the First National bank and Reading and allied railroad interests, to take control of the 75,000 shares of the Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton railroad, turned back into Mr. Morgan's hands by the Erie railroad. The shares cost Mr. Morgan more than \$10,000,000. It is generally believed that the personnel of the syndicate confirms the announcement made several days ago that the property is to be apportioned between the Pennsylvania and the Nickel Plate, which are owned by the Vanderbilts."

GIRL IS STRICKEN BLIND DURING THE DANCING

HER VISION FAILS IN MIDST OF WALTZ

Lights Burned Brilliantly, but World Was Dark to Anna Schaub—Second Attack in Two Years—"I Am Blind Again," Her Cry

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—With all before her a blank, Anna Schaub, of 235 West Kinney street, Newark, sat today rocking to and fro in a chair in the home of her mother lamenting the fact that she had been stricken blind. Only twenty-four hours before the girl was apparently in the best of health and spirits. On Saturday night, with several of her relatives, she attended a reception given by the unknown Pleasure club in a hall near their home. With the other merry-makers she had danced for several hours and was in the midst of a waltz when she gave a scream and fell to the floor in a faint. Relatives and friends resorted to simple remedies and soon revived her. When she was able to speak she asked what made it so dark, and when told that the lights were burning brilliantly, cried out in agony: "Oh mother! I am blind again."

REPORTS ON MILITIA

Gen. Ainsworth Says About 75 Per Cent Can Be Relied Upon

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—General F. C. Ainsworth, militia secretary, in his report on the militia of the United States, says it is estimated that about 75 per cent of the organized militia would respond to the call for troops to repel invasion or suppress insurrection against the authority of the United States, the percentage being the same as that estimated for the preceding year. The secretary says: "Increase of interest on the part of the younger men in the militia has been marked and the means by which the organizations has been appreciably advanced."

BEVERIDGE ON STATEHOOD

Senator Confident That Two New States Will Be Formed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—Senator Beveridge of Indiana, chairman of the committee on territories of the United States, said today at a conference with the president in regard to the status of statehood legislation. The senator is confident that congress at the present session will erect two new states, and that the opposition to the constitution will not be serious. One state will be erected from Oklahoma and Indian territory and the other from Arizona and New Mexico. Considerable opposition to statehood for Arizona and New Mexico exists, but Senator Beveridge believes it will not be successful.

BURTON WANTS NO ASSIGNMENTS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—Senator Burton this afternoon wired his colleague, Senator Long, notifying him that he did not desire any committee assignments, pending the determination of his case in the courts, and Senator Long so informed Senator Hale, as chairman of the Republican committee on committees. Senator Burton is at present chairman of the committee on forest reservations and a member of the committees on postoffices, public lands, pensions and claims.

HEARS INSURANCE COMMISSIONERS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—Insurance commissioners representing various states had a conference with the president today to urge him to use his influence to have a uniform state law regarding insurance.

WARSZAWA, RUSSIAN POLAND, DEC. 9.

There was a heavy run today on the government savings banks as a result of a campaign against the issue of the depositors demanded their money in gold. A battalion of military engineers have been ordered to Gora Kazary, government of Warsaw, complaining of bad food and unsuitable quarters. The mutineers have destroyed the barracks kitchens and have otherwise damaged the buildings. The military authorities have refrained from making arrests, fearing that it would provoke greater disturbances. The military telegraphers at Kier have refused to take the place of striking civilians. The German government has asked the government of Russia to protect the Warsaw gas works, which are the property of a German company.

MORE FREEDOM FOR PRESS

Censorship Practically Abolished by Imperial Ukase. ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 8, via Eydkuhnen, Dec. 8.—An imperial ukase issued today contains provisional laws governing the press in general. The censorship of periodicals and illustrated papers is abolished in country districts and punishments for the periodical press are practically abolished. Responsibility for breach of the press laws must be established in courts of law. The right of the minister of the interior to prohibit publication of the discussion of questions affecting the government is abrogated. The ukase

(Continued from Page One.) with Dr. Adler that the number of children employed throughout the country was increasing faster than the efforts to cope with the situation.

Dr. A. J. McKelway of Charlotte, N. C., after stating that 91 per cent of the children employed in manufacturing industries in the south were to be found in the four cotton growing, cotton manufacturing states of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama said: "It is a rude awakening that has come to our people, that the abolition of negro slavery marked the beginning of white child slavery; that our pet industry (cotton) is not different in the south from what it was for a hundred years in Old and New England, an industry distinguished for long hours and low wages and cursed by the employment of children on a larger scale and of sadder years than any other industry of the world. In this year of the twentieth century there are 60,000 children in southern cotton mills from 6 to 16 years of age, toiling 12 hours a day or 12 hours a night, and reducing the wage scale to what is necessary for the support of a child instead of what will support a family or manhood wages. And the south is now awakening to the fact that its characteristic industry has so entrenched itself behind all the commercial life of the south that it is able to control legislation in opposition to the popular will that would express itself in the enactment of humane laws and their enforcement."
