

FILL TRAILS RACE IS KILLED

OUR LILLIE STUMBLES AND BREAKS NECK

Valuable Animal Crosses Legs on the Stretch Turn, Throwing Himself.

Achellita Trips Over Her. Jockeys Slightly Injured

The first accident of the winter racing season at Ascot occurred in the final race yesterday, in which Our Lillie, Stubbs' Bros' four-year-old Hermence-Betty Barry filly fell and broke her neck and Achellita, which was immediately behind Our Lillie, also fell and was severely bruised.

Jockey Dearborn, who was riding Achellita, was thrown violently to the ground and sustained a broken collar bone and Jockey Scoville, who had the mount on Our Lillie, was severely bruised and scratched in the fall.

Achellita, coming with a rush and immediately behind the Stubbs filly, stumbled over the prostrate filly and was thrown to the ground.

Our Lillie died within a few minutes, but Achellita recovered and finished riderless.

Neither filly was in the running for the purse, having dropped out of the race at the flag fall, when the bunch of thirteen scrambled for positions.

Gach was considered the favorite and the Stubbs filly was roundly bet her best form and would have been a factor in the future had she continued to improve as she had in the last two weeks.

Our Lillie was valued at \$1000 and was entered to be sold for \$600.

Memories a Surprise

Memories turned the surprise of the afternoon by beating Hans Wagner and Druid in the \$500 handicap, the fourth race on the card.

Memories was made favorite in the betting at 8 to 5 and was heavily played to win. Druid was first away from the post, but in the scramble for position landed fourth, with Hans on the rail.

Jake Sanders raced speedily to the front and opened up a gap of two lengths, which he held to the place. Jockeys Miller and Bill Curtis third, Druid remaining in last position.

Jockey Fischer made his move with Druid in the stretch and for a moment seemed to have an excellent chance of getting the winning filly through on the rail, but Miller reined Memories into the pathway and cut off Druid, forcing her to pull up slightly.

Here Memories was set down and sent after Jake Sanders and Wagner. Miller piloted the Holland filly through the speeding field in a desperate stretch drive sent her home first by a head.

Wagner came stoutly in the finish and crossed on his opponent's place, exhibiting all his old time speed and courage in the final strides, which encouraged his backers in the belief that the splendid handicap horse would have won at longer odds.

Sanders held his lead long enough to land in the show position, one length in front of the fast running Druid, which finished courageously despite the interference.
