HAS FAITH IN MANKIND Rev. Frank DeWitt Talmage, During Eloquent Sermon, Says Most People Are Honest

In his sermon at the First Presbyterian church yesterday Rev. Frank DeWitt Talmage spoke of man, the debtor, in his true relations to his divine creditor. The minister said in part: "Many people talk as if this world was full of rogues. I do not believe any such charge. There is more honesty in the world than it gets credit for. Indeed, it is my belief that most people are honest, that most people want to do right. This is not a world of hypocrites. All men are not scoundrels. When, in 1776, the statement was made in the British parliament that every man had his price, and that all men could be bribed, a statesman arose and said: 'That charge is not true. Benedict Arnold might become a traitor, but there are many generals in the American army whom all the money in King George's treasury cannot buy. If you have not found this kind of a world there is something wrong with your own principles. The man who declares that all men are rogues at heart is practically making confession of his own dishonesty. If you tell me that all men are rogues, I conclude that you yourself would cheat if you had the chance. It sometimes takes a thief to catch a thief.
