

LAWYERS MAKE A BITTER FIGHT NEVINS CASE IS UNDER CONSIDERATION

Judge Rose Hears Evidence in Automobile Speeding Trial—May Impose Jail Sentence

With the danger of being imprisoned for his third arrest on the charge of violating the automobile speed ordinance, W. G. Nevins will have to wait until Saturday morning until he knows his fate; for Judge Rose took the case under advisement after the hearing last evening.

After nearly a dozen continuances, the attorneys for Nevins attempted to have the case continued yesterday afternoon. Judge Rose decided that the case should be heard yesterday and at 7:30 o'clock last evening the hearing of the case was commenced.

The court room was crowded with sympathizers of Mr. Nevins. Nevins entered a plea of not guilty and a demurrer was filed subject to a subsequent filing of a demurrer and the case proceeded.

Moynier was placed on the witness stand and gave his testimony. The officer stated that he and Officer Berchold were riding and found that he was traveling at the rate of twenty-three miles an hour. For nearly two hours the witness was kept on the stand by objections of Attorneys Lawyer, Brown and Wideman of the defense.

Officer Berchold made the best witness for the prosecution. Nevins started in the same role for the defense. His answers were ready and to the point, and if the case is won by the defense it will be because of his testimony.

TWO FALL FROM CARS

Burns attempted to board the car while it was in motion and fell. As he did so a bottle he was carrying under his arm broke on the pavement and he cut his hand on the broken glass.

YOUNG GIRL SWALLOWS PIN

Parents Have Daughter Removed to Receiving Hospital, Where Serious Results Are Feared

Hazel Doty, fifteen years old, swallowed a pin while dressing a doll at her home at Twenty-second street and Santa Fe avenue. Immediately the girl was removed to the receiving hospital, where an examination was made by the police surgeons.

Miss Doty became aware that the pin was lodged in her throat and an effort was made to call a physician. Unable to find a doctor the parents of the young woman had her taken to the receiving hospital on a car. While on her way to the hospital the pin became lodged from her throat and entered her stomach.

Physicians are puzzled over the case and fear results may prove serious.

EXPECT SLEEPING GIRL TO WAKEN

IS CONSCIOUS FOR PERIOD OF FIVE MINUTES

Physicians Believe Comatose State of Miss Florence Parker Will Be Ended Within Twelve Hours

Within twelve hours attending physicians expect Miss Florence Parker, who for thirteen days has slept continually, to waken. Yesterday afternoon, for the first time, the young woman remained awake for five minutes, the longest interval of wakefulness that Miss Parker has experienced since she slipped into the comatose state.

Miss Parker is the daughter of Colonel J. C. Parker, a wealthy mine owner residing at Tucson, Ariz. The young woman left the former home of the Parkers at Deer Lodge, Mont., last summer to join her father in Arizona. After a short time it was noticed that she was becoming nervous and affected by a strange ailment.

Physicians advised a change for her and the family came to Los Angeles about a month ago. Later they went north, as the climate of Southern California seemed to have only a temporary effect on the young woman. Then they went back to Arizona.

Miss Parker's condition became steadily worse, and fourteen days ago, while in the care of Dr. Fenner of a Tucson hospital, the young woman relapsed into a sleep. Efforts to awaken her were of no avail. In hope that something might be done for the young woman she was brought to this city Monday and sent to the Sisters' hospital.

Under the care of some of the most prominent nerve specialists of the west the young woman has been treated. At first they saw no change in her condition and at last declared themselves baffled by the case. However, Miss Parker is apparently becoming better.

Though very low Wednesday, she showed signs of awakening yesterday, and for five minutes remained awake. She then relapsed into the slumber from which she did not awaken all night. It was noted that her condition was continually improving yesterday, and it is thought by the attending physicians that the presence of her mother will have much to do with her recovery.

Mrs. Parker arrived from Tucson last evening.

RAIDED BY MOSQUITOES

Mammoth Species With Double Appetites Invade Jersey Town Even in Middle of Winter

MILLYVILLE, N. J., Jan. 25.—Mid-winter mosquitoes, mammoth size with double appetites are breaking all records by raiding many of the towns near here. Residents of Cumberland and Ormond, four miles east of this city, complain that during the last two evenings these pesky insects of the genuine Jersey kind have made it very uncomfortable for those who have gone out of doors.

They are much larger than the usual summer mosquito and have seemingly double appetites. George Dixon, an elderly farmer of Ormond, states that he has never in his life seen larger mosquitoes than those which invaded his farm last evening.

WOULD SACRIFICE HIS CHILD

Man Gives Wife Open Air Bath—Minister Who Caused Trouble Tossed by Bull

GREENSBURG, Pa., Jan. 25.—Andrew Lohr, a traveling minister of Stapleton, is in jail here, and Mr. and Mrs. Samuel James of Stapleton, Pa., are alleged to be insane as a result of religious rites practiced in the James home.

Lohr is charged with having induced James to burn \$11,000 worth of furniture, first taking out \$900 hidden in the sofa.

Lohr also induced James to attempt to sacrifice his 10-year-old son by burning him on an altar with a 4-year-old Durham bull.

James strapped his wife in a field and let her stand in a tub of cold water to drive out an evil spirit. Lohr, in attempting to sacrifice the bull, was tossed over the fence by the bull. He told Mr. and Mrs. James that he could lead the animal to the altar as if it was a gentle child.

James, the boy to be sacrificed with the bull, also put up a desperate fight. When the James woman was given a cold bath in the open fields neighbors interfered and preferred charges against Lohr before Squire Miller of Stapleton.
