MINER'S OUTFIT NEAR TELLS TRAGIC STORY

Letters Addressed to "Alex. Rademacher, Garlock," Indicate a Mystery of Four Years Ago Is Solved

Letters received in Los Angeles from Sheriff P. M. Coburn state that V. A. Barta of Salton and his partner, Arnone Joseph, had found evidence of a death on the desert

Among the equipments was a copy of "Mining and Metallurgy" of Los Angeles, dated January 15, 1901, and a small worn Bible protected by the canvas wagon cover

The skeleton of a man was found about fifteen miles from the outfit, off towards the Colorado river

Jacob Miller, mine foreman of the Chitcheaw Mining company, said that he knew Aleck Rademacher in Garlock, Kern county, having heard about five years ago that he suddenly disappeared and that parties in Garlock were anxiously looking for him

Barta thought that Rademacher had gone into the desert insufficiently provided with water, and that his animals had deserted him. In his effort to trail them he had probably perished

The sheriff has communicated with Garlock

MOROSCO SEEKS INJUNCTION AGAINST BELASCO

Two Theaters Contend for Rights to Game Drama, and Burbank Manager Makes an Appeal to Law

Manager Morosco of the Burbank yesterday applied for an injunction to restrain the Belasco presentation of this play, as written and copyrighted by Frances Hodgson Burnett

Where the legal rights reside will be decided by Judge Wellborn's opinion tomorrow

HOUSEWIVES OBJECT TO SHORT-WEIGHT BUTTER, LARD AND OTHER FOOD PRODUCTS PUT UP IN PACKAGES

Sixteen ounces make one pound. One hundred pounds make one hundred-weight. Twenty hundred-weights make one ton

That's the way it used to be. Fully believe that merchants would respect this mathematical combination many young housewives of Los Angeles have consented to tying the matrimonial knot and embark upon the sea of conjugal happiness

But a recent discovery of "short weights" made by several of the more enterprising youthful housekeepers of late has put a noticeable damper upon the rushing business usually done by Clerks Watson and Shea of the marriage license bureau within the past week

Incidentally the business of the managers of the leading general merchandise stores of this city, principally the establishments of J. M. Brooks, in butter, cheese, crackers and other articles which come supposedly in pound packages or multiples thereof, has decreased, and the sale of certain articles has been accomplished only after energetic persuasive argument on the part of the floor manager or some other able and qualified aid-de-camp

Keeps Housewives Guessing. It is to be hoped that the recent discovery will not increase the amount of business done by the divorce courts or work toward the detriment of our strenuous president's admirable stand against the divorce courts

However, a discovery of a system of short weights has been made, and in consequence a small catastrophe is imminent

The average housewife who plans to make her devoted husband's weekly income meet the household expenses is busy with pad and pencil and with a reading glass and perhaps a toothbrush and a bottle of ammonia looking for corners

That this system of short weights exists is admitted by the leading grocers of this city. Two of the most prominent grocers have given out an extensive interview proving this

Protest Against Short Weight. The cry of the housewives is not against the quality of the goods that come in packages, but against the fact that the same thing may be had in full measure when purchased by the bulk, whereas when purchased by the package there is almost without exception a shortage of at least two ounces

The retail grocers that are compelled to handle this class of necessities that come under the head of short weights are claimed to be obliged to cater to the wholesalers of same

Consequently they say they do not handle the short weight articles and the goods that leave their stores are only carefully weighed and found to be of full measure before they are placed on sale, but are examined as to their chemical purity
