ACCEPT THEORY OF DESPONDENCY

IT IS BELIEVED YOUNG LAWYER FEARED CONSUMPTION

Father of Charles Whitney Ward, Who Shot Himself, Expected to Arrive Tonight and Will Take Remains East

The father of Charles Whitney Ward, the young Boston lawyer who shot himself Wednesday morning at Hotel Trenton, and who died Thursday night, will probably arrive in Los Angeles tonight.

Coroner Trout will hold the inquest tomorrow. While hurrying to the bedside of his dying son, the heartbroken father received a telegram early yesterday morning telling him that his son had died and that the hope of seeing him alive was gone.

According to the dispatches from Boston, Ward had not thought of a legal separation from her husband and that it was known among young Ward's friends that he had come to California on account of threatened consumption.

If there is any other secret regarding the motive for Ward's shooting himself it probably will never come to light.

R. C. Gype, roommate of the unfortunate young lawyer, said that he saw Ward deliberately shoot himself. He gave no information of the reasons for the suicide other than on the morning of the shooting, when he told the reporters that he thought Ward had domestic troubles. A letter which Ward had written but not mailed to his wife was full of endearing terms, and showed that there was the utmost affection between the young couple, and the theory of despondency over ill health is the accepted one.

After the inquest the father will take the body of his son back to Boston, where Ward was highly regarded as a lawyer and clubman.

KEEP BEARDSLEY OCCUPIED

ILLEGAL USE OF MAIL

Charged with using the mail for indecent purposes, Robert Witham, 335 South Spring street, was arrested yesterday afternoon upon a complaint issued under direction of United States District Attorney Oscar Lawler.

A warrant was also issued for the arrest of a woman at Randsburg, with whom Witham is said to have been in correspondence relative to obtaining girls to go to Randsburg for immoral purposes.

Witham disclaimed any knowledge of the reason why the woman should have written to him, and will probably be allowed to remain on a bail bond pending an examination before United States Commissioner Van Dyke.

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RIDES IN FRONT OF A CAR

Bicyclist Price Nearly Loses His Life as a Result of His Own Carelessness

L. S. Price of 186 West Forty-fifth street nearly lost his life as a result of his own carelessness yesterday morning when his wheel was run down by a car near Seventeenth and Main streets. Price was hurled to the pavement and lay within two inches of the trucks.

At the receiving hospital it was found that the man had two scalp wounds and several severe bruises, but he will recover in a few days.

According to the motorman, Price rode in front of the rapidly-moving car and did not pay any heed to the warning gong. Passengers said that it was strange the man was not killed, and that it was a case of pure carelessness. Price claims that he did not see the car or hear any gong.

BOBBIE BURNS DEMANDS PAY

Deposed Secretary of Fire Department Insists on Drawing Salary for Position

"Bobbie" Burns, the deposed secretary of the fire department, yesterday presented a demand to the finance committee of the city council for \$115, as his salary for February, although he served less than a week in the position.

Burns claims he is the only one authorized to hold the position and that although B. W. Land has acted as secretary of the fire department almost continuously for the last six months he has no legal right to the place.

Both Land and Burns took the civil service examination for the position. Burns secured a passing grade and Land did not. The commission certified Burns for the place and the next week, however, Chief Lips declared he could not get along with Burns and said he wanted Land back. The fire commission removed Burns and gave Land another emergency appointment.

It is probable Burns will take the case to the courts.

NEIGHBORS AIR THEIR TROUBLES IN COURT

MRS. SAMUEL COHEN OBJECTS TO EPITHET APPLIED

Swears Before Jury That Mrs. Lena Bertelson Called Her a Pig and Other Equally Objectionable Names

A case in which the word "pig" figured extensively was heard yesterday before Police Judge Rose, when Samuel Cohen and his family tried to convince a jury that Mrs. Lena Bertelson and her friend, Miss Pauline Cohen, had disturbed their peace.

The principal cause of complaint was that the defendants had used the word "pig" with offensive meaning, as Mrs. Cohen, her husband and children descended from the upper flat at 1307 West Ninth street on a December evening. Mrs. Bertelson owned the house and occupied the lower flat, leaving the upper portion to the Cohens.

Samuel Cohen told of the offensive epithets that had been applied, as he supposed, to his wife.

Mrs. Flora Cohen said such word was enunciated with great distinctness, with the intention of wounding her feelings.

Miss Stella Cohen gave her version of the trouble and Miss Sadie Cohen added her mite to the testimony.

"Those ladies called off their dogs, telling them that I was not good enough to associate with them," said Mrs. Cohen as she leaned towards the jury.

"She applied the epithet 'pig' to me and said a lot of words that I do not care to repeat in court."

When the defendants had their inning, they explained how the pig episode had led to misconceptions on the part of the Cohen family, whom they averred were very sensitive about any mention to the porcine family.

Mrs. Bertelson said that yesterday she and Miss Pauline Cohen had been out riding and met a little pig on West Adams street. Their pet dogs pursued the animal, and that evening they were relating the little incident to each other when the Cohens came down stairs.

Both defendants said they regretted that Mrs. Cohen had taken an innocent remark to herself.

Several witnesses testified that there had been trouble between Mrs. Bertelson and her tenants for a long time and that both sides had used words that would not look good in print.

The courtroom was crowded with friends of both sides, and standing room was at a premium, while the woes of two families in the same flat were told to the jury.

After hearing the evidence the jury decided that the defendants were not guilty.

SENT HER BACK TO FAMILY

Mrs. Tucker's Reasons for Asking for Decree of Divorce From Husband

Maude M. Tucker was granted an interlocutory decree of divorce from Albert E. Tucker by Judge Trask in department four of the superior court yesterday.

The couple were married in Michigan and later the husband went to Boston to engage in business there. According to the allegations of the wife, her husband sent for her to visit him in Boston, but when she arrived there he paid no attention to her and sent her back to her family. He refused to give her money and she came west with her relatives.
