TEXAS SHERIFF AFTER SEERESS

MARGARET GRAHAM LOCKED UP IN CITY JAIL

Greatly Exploited Psychic Wanted in Lone Star State for Swindling Woman in Silk Worm Project

Margaret Graham, who has been extensively advertised as a psychic and seeress, is in the toils of the law.

She was arrested yesterday on information furnished by Sheriff Tobin of San Antonio, Tex., and Margaret Graham, alias Sauer, was taken from her luxurious rooms on Broadway and locked up in the city jail.

At her apartments on South Broadway the country by various clever games and that thirteen indictments are pending against her in Texas.

One of her most successful methods of reaching the credulous was to use a scheme to propagate the silk worm. She advertised widely that a small investment would net large returns and gain a fortune.

Scheme Netted Big Returns It is said that she cleared up \$30,000 on this scheme but had to leave the state, and when she arrived in Los Angeles she posed as a fortune teller.

At her apartments on South Broadway she received many of the society women of Los Angeles, who are said to have given up thousands of dollars to this woman with a "hypnotic spell."

In addition to her local practice, Mrs. Graham did an extensive business through the mails, charging \$5 for a "full life reading."

Her alleged husband, Charles Sauer, is not wanted by the Texas authorities. He has acted as her manager in this city and has put many of the bills by his personal checks.

Sheriff Tobin of San Antonio was in the city yesterday and after consultation with Deputy District Attorney Fleming the police were instructed to arrest the woman as a fugitive from justice.

Operated in Kansas The Texas sheriff says that he has information that Mrs. Sauer at one time operated in Topeka, Kas. She removed to Texas and started her scheme there by introducing the worm culture in California.

She worked on the plan of the notorious Franklin syndicate, whose failure gave rise to an account of the work of the juvenile court and detention home in Los Angeles.
