Kane ripped off a neat single to left and camped on the first bag.

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

SUTTON WINS FROM HOPPE

New York Billiard Expert Sets New World's Record at an Average of 100 in Game

By Associated Press. NEW YORK, April 17.—The shortest and most exciting game of the world's championship 18.2 billiard tournament was played at the Madison Square Garden concert hall tonight and a new world's record was established.

George Sutton, formerly of Elmira and now a resident of this city, in defeating Willie Hoppe, the world's champion, in 18.2 ball game in the fifteenth game of the tournament, made 500 points in five innings, an average of 100, which constitutes the new world's record.

The former record was 50, held by Maurice Vignaux of Paris, who made it in competition four years ago.

The highest run of the tournament previous to tonight was 168, and Sutton made it, but he outclassed this with 254 unfinished tonight.

OFFICIALS SEIZE SMUGGLED GOODS

SEVERAL BOXES NABBED AT BAKERSFIELD

Officers and Sailors of the Battleship Oregon Forward Goods Secured in the Orient to Eastern Friends

By Associated Press. BAKERSFIELD, April 17.—The goods which were smuggled from the Orient by the battleship Oregon last week have been intercepted in this city, and last evening United States Custom Inspector Behan arrived from San Francisco to take charge of the contraband articles.

The custom officials at San Francisco got on track of the goods and found that they had been delivered by the Oceanic Transfer company of San Francisco to the Santa Fe. The assistance of the officials of the railroad was secured and Agent Shick of the local office received instructions to hold the cars in which the goods were shipped on their way east.

Small Boxes in Three Cars The boxes, rather small in size, were distributed throughout three cars. This afternoon Agent Shick and Inspector Behan singled them out from the rest of the articles in the cars.

The smuggled cases were all consigned to eastern destinations and Inspector Behan is under the impression that the articles are gifts sent from officers and sailors on board the vessel to friends and relatives in the east.
