BEES ATTACK A RANCHER

Attacked on Mowing Machine and His Team Suffered Stings,
Too

SAN BERNARDINO, April 17.—A. Y. Pearl was arraigned today before Justice C. L. Thomas and his preliminary hearing set for May 1, the same date as the hearings of the others implicated in the same affair. His bail was fixed at \$1500 in each case, the bonds to be filed and approved by Judge Smith in Los Angeles, Pearl to be released as soon as word to that effect is received.

William Speed, aged 60 years, had a fearful experience with bees while running a mowing machine. His team brushed into a small tree on which a swarm had alighted, the bees swarming about Speed and the team. The horses became maddened and began to back and plunge, throwing off Speed behind the machine, which was backed into a fence, the wheels resting on the aged man's body when the fence stopped the machine. When rescued he was in a serious condition, being a mass of stings and badly bruised. The horses were one mass of blotches from the stings and it required several hours work to save their lives. Speed is in a serious condition.

The percolating water suit which was decided adversely to the ranchers of the valley yesterday by Judge Bennett of Kern will be appealed to the higher courts. It is still firm, it is believed by plaintiffs' attorneys that a victory will be scored by the ranchers, as the case is felt to be in line with the Katz-Walkinshaw decision of the supreme court rendered about two years ago in which a new rule for water litigation was laid down.

LONG BEACH, April 17.—At the adjourned meeting of the board of trustees last night a petition was presented by the Los Angeles Dock and Terminal company, asking for permission to fill certain streets in what is known as Back Bay tract No. 1.

It is the intention of the company to fill in the ground mentioned to a height of twelve feet above low tide. It is only one of the many steps that this company is taking in the reclamation of the ground in this vicinity.

PASTOR FACING STRANGE CHARGE

NEW YORK MINISTER PRESENTS NEW IDEAS

Claims Christ's Father Was a Carpenter Belonging to Middle Classes. Also That Birth Was No Mystery

BATAVIA, N. Y., April 17.—The first trial for many years in the Protestant Episcopal church is scheduled to begin here today, when the Rev. Algernon Sydney Crapsey, D. D., for twenty-five years rector of St. Andrew's church at Rochester, will be placed on trial before an ecclesiastical court, charged with utterances from the pulpit of that church and in print which are alleged to be in violation of the tenets of the Protestant Episcopal faith.

In 1904 and 1905 Dr. Crapsey delivered a series of sermons. These were afterwards published under his authority, under the title, "Religion and Politics." The presentation against him contains fifteen extracts from this book, which are the basis for the charges that he intentionally expressed disbelief in these doctrines of the church.

Extracts From Book
The divinity of Christ, the conception of the Holy Ghost, the virgin birth, the bodily resurrection and the trinity.

A second specification under this first charge is that he made utterances of a like nature as recently as December 21 last, with the same intent to deny the same doctrines as enunciated in the apostles and nicene creeds.

The second and last charge in the presentation is that Dr. Crapsey violated his ordination vows by failing to conform to the doctrines, disciplines and worship of the Protestant Episcopal church.

Under the second specification of the first charge the utterances attributed to him in his December sermon are these:

Further Utterances
First—Jesus was born of parents belonging to the middle class.

Second—He was born of a simple father and mother.

Third—He was the son of a carpenter.

Fourth—The fact that the early Christians, predicated as a miraculous birth to Christ was to be regarded as one of the greatest misfortunes that has ever befallen mankind.

The truth or falsity of the church's doctrines is not to be argued at the trial. The sole question is whether the things that Dr. Crapsey said are contrary to those doctrines, and did he so intend them to be?

It is understood that Dr. Crapsey's defense will hold that under a liberal interpretation of the creed he has not contradicted its doctrines.

If he is found guilty of intentional denial of the tenets there is but one punishment—dismissal from the church.

RIVERSIDE MAY ASK FOR ADEQUATE CHARTER

MASS MEETING IS PROPOSED BY MERCHANTS

Some time ago the chamber of commerce passed a resolution favorable to a new charter and now it is proposed to hold a mass meeting at which the matter can be discussed with freedom.
