DIES WHILE IN DENTIST'S CHAIR

Autopsy Shows That Status Lymphaticus Caused Sudden Death of Ada Larson in Office Building

Miss Ida Larson died while under the influence of an anesthetic yesterday afternoon in a dentist's chair in the office of Dr. Adam Carlson, 222 Mason building, according to information received by coroner Trout.

A certain veil of mystery shrouds the case, and owing to inability to locate Dr. Carlson after the occurrence but little is known of the cause of the young woman's death.

From coroner Trout it was learned late last evening that Miss Larson went to Dr. Carlson's office late in the afternoon. It was found necessary to administer chloroform to the young woman, and Dr. P. Bullard was called, says the coroner.

Dr. Bullard said last evening that he and Dr. Campbell had just finished the autopsy over Miss Larson's remains.

"The cause of the young woman's death was status lymphaticus, a condition rarely discovered before death," said Dr. Bullard. "To this condition is due death. It is a form of shock. In all probability Miss Larson would have died when the tooth was pulled if she had not taken the anesthetic."

ISSUES FREE FREIGHT ORDER

Agent of Southern Pacific Gives Instructions Relative to Sending Supplies North

The following letter has been sent by T. A. Graham, assistant general freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, to Frank Wiggins, secretary of the chamber of commerce, F. J. Zeehandelaar, secretary of the Merchants and Manufacturers' association, and H. C. Lichtenberger, secretary of the Native Sons' relief committee:

"Indications point that for some time yet there will be a large movement of relief supplies from all directions in both carloads and less carloads, for San Francisco sufferers.

"Such supplies are being handled free, and in order to distinguish such shipments from commercial freight and facilitate their handling and that proper distribution be made after they reach destination, all such supplies should be consigned to American Red Cross association, San Francisco.

"In order to obtain free rate, it will be necessary to so consign, as we cannot undertake to handle at free rate supplies consigned to individuals. It will greatly facilitate matters by consigning shipments as above."
