

APOSTLE SCORNED

Voliva Calls Dowie a Criminal

Whole Family Should Be Exterminated

Wife of "False Prophet" Held by New Leader to Be Equally as Guilty as Her Husband

CHICAGO, April 28.—"I am glad to be home again."
With these words on his lips John Alexander Dowie, the deposed leader of the Christian Catholic church in America, this afternoon stepped within the portals of Shiloh house, thus completing his much heralded entry into Zion City, after an absence of several months, during which time he had been deserted by a large part of his followers and had been stripped of all real authority.
Mrs. Dowie, the wife of the "First Apostle," met him at the door of Shiloh house and gave him a hearty welcome.
No Pomp Marks Return
Dowie's return to Zion City was void of all pomp and ceremony. Only a handful of people were at the station to greet him, and the majority of these were women.
Dowie left the Auditorium Annex, where he had been stopping since his return from Mexico, shortly after 1 o'clock.
He was driven to the Northwestern station, where a private car had been attached to the regular 2 o'clock train on that road.
The train bearing Dowie and his party arrived at Zion City at 3:45 p. m. As Dowie alighted from the train he was greeted by shouts of "Peace to thee."
He responded with the customary "Peace to thee multiplied."
Weather Man Pulls the String
Rain, which had been threatening for some time, then began to fall, and a crowd with one accord began to sing "Showers of Blessing." Under the shelter of an umbrella held by one of his attendants Dowie made his way to a carriage; he then turned and, facing the assembled people, made a short address.
"With all my heart I desire to thank you for your kind greeting," said he. "It is not fitting that I should speak at length at this time. I shall hope to meet you all at our morning sacrifice meeting for praise and prayer at 6:30 o'clock and again in the afternoon at 2 o'clock."
"I Stand on Zion's Mount"
Dowie then quoted a stanza from the hymn, "I Stand on Zion's Mount." Then lifting his hands he cried: "Stand firm, then, Rock of my Salvation."
"I have done nothing since I saw your faces," he continued, "of which I should be ashamed. Not one of the accusations made against me is true, not one. God bless you. Now do as I bid you. Good-by."
He then entered his carriage and was driven to Shiloh house.
Wilbur Glenn Voliva and his followers held a meeting in the tabernacle, the auditorium being about two-thirds full. In an address Voliva not only denounced Dowie, but Mrs. Dowie as well. He said:
Scores Mrs. Dowie
"I do not propose to permit any sinner in this movement to escape. Do not think that Dowie is the only one to be called to account."
The next one will be Mrs. Jane Dowie.
"If she thinks she is going to stand before this people without confessing her sins, she is greatly mistaken. In some respects she is as great a sinner as Dowie. She is on his side tonight and always has been. The lust in her heart for power is as great as in his. I say the whole Dowie family must be swept off the earth."
Greeted by Cheers
This statement was roundly applauded.
Continuing, Voliva said:
"For years that family has sucked the blood out of this people to satisfy their lust for fine clothes and to make a showing."
"They have made no confession and no attempt to repent, but they still attempt to bluff you."
"If Dowie is not insane, the other word to brand him is the word 'criminal.'"
Voliva will use the college buildings as the place of worship tomorrow, while Dowie holds forth in the tabernacle, it being the "first apostle's" turn to use that building, in accordance with the order of the court allowing the opposing factions the use of the big meeting house on alternate days.

CHICAGO FREE FROM STRIKES

Extensive Labor Troubles Practically Wiped Out in the Windy City

CHICAGO, April 28.—For the first time in years May 1 promises to find Chicago practically free from extensive labor disturbances.
Only one or two strikes of importance are in prospect.
The chief labor struggle now threatening to begin next Tuesday involves 3000 iron molders.
It is certain that a majority of these men will strike.
Notices were sent yesterday to concerns within a radius of thirty-five miles stating the molders will quit in all shops where demands for an increase in wages from \$3 to \$3.25 are not granted.
Several minor strikes in this industry already are now in progress.
Of ten other unions which have agreements expiring on May 1 only two or three are said to be contemplating radical action and in these cases there are strong probabilities of amicable settlement.

TWO KILLED BY REVOLUTIONISTS

ODESSA POLICE ASSASSINATED IN BROAD DAYLIGHT

Plot Was Far-Reaching and Contemplated Also the Death of a Third Member of the Force

ODESSA, April 28.—The chief of police, who played such a prominent role in the October massacres, and a policeman, were assassinated by revolutionists here today in broad daylight.
The plot was far-reaching and contemplated also the assassination of Assistant Chief of Police Pottavtchenko and several other policemen.
A young girl named Jerebtzova threw a bomb at Pottavtchenko, who was on the way to the hospital to visit one of the wounded policemen. Her aim was poor and Pottavtchenko was unhurt.
The girl was seriously wounded by Pottavtchenko's orderly.

GOV. PARDEE GRANTS PARDON

Appeal of Earthquake Sufferer Opens Prison Doors to James Fitzgerald

SACRAMENTO, April 28.—Governor Pardee today granted a pardon to James Fitzgerald of San Francisco, who was sent to San Quentin for one year for robbing mail boxes.
Fitzgerald's wife made a pathetic appeal to the governor, saying he is the only living male relative to look after a number of women who lost their homes in the earthquake.

THIRTY CHINESE LOST AT SEA

British Steamer Sinks Vessel From the Orient and Many Drown

SINGAPORE, April 28.—The British steamer Haversham Grange, having on board 3000 Russian troops bound for Vladivostok for Odessa, arrived here today and reported having been in collision in the Straits of Malacca with the Chinese steamer Benton.
The latter sank and 30 of the 101 Chinese on board the vessel were drowned.
The Haversham Grange brought the survivors to this port.
Her forehold is full of water.

SHOWERS DRENCH SAN DIEGO

Total Precipitation for the Season to Present Time Is 13.50 Inches

SAN DIEGO, April 28.—Light showers are falling here today and the weather is cool.
Last night .13 of an inch of rain fell in the city, but the fall was heavier in the country, being .70 at Cuyamaca lake.
At the latter point the total for the season is 51 inches.
In the city the total is 13.50, an excess of 3 1/2 inches.

MAY KISS AND MAKE UP AGAIN

Countess Boni de Castellane Must Wait, However, Until the Count Is at Leisure

PARIS, April 28.—The first tribunal of the Seine was to have heard the arguments today and determined the question of a reconciliation between Countess Boni de Castellane and her husband, but the hearing was postponed.
This was owing to the desire of the count, who is a candidate for re-election to the chamber of deputies, not to proceed with the case pending the conclusion of the electoral campaign.

CRAPSEY TRIAL COMES TO END

Ecclesiastical Court Takes Evidence Under Consideration—Will Render Verdict to Bishop

BATAVIA, N. Y., April 28.—The fate of the Rev. Algernon S. Crapsey as a clergyman of the Protestant Episcopal church rests with his judges. The trial of the rector of St. Andrew's, Rochester, on charges of heresy and violation of ordination vows, ended today with the final arguments of counsel for the accused and for the prosecution.
The ecclesiastical court of five members took the evidence under consideration and will render a verdict to Bishop Walker of the diocese of western New York on or before May 15.

CHICAGO TENANTS TO MOVE

Over Six Thousand Families Prepare to Vacate Present Quarters by May 1

CHICAGO, April 28.—There are 6000 families in Chicago either on the move or anxious to be within the next few days.
The number of families who intend to move is 20 per cent greater than last year.
Rents have been raised 10 per cent on an average all over the city, which is given as one of the reasons for the great number of families moving.
The average householder will not stay in the same house and pay increased rent.

BRANDIT'S BULLET DEALS OUT DEATH

POSSE STILL SEARCHING FOR MURDERER SMITH

Country Near Woodburn, Oregon, Patrolled by Deputies and Sheriff Believes Capture Will Result

WOODBURN, Ore., April 28.—The countryside about Woodburn is being patrolled tonight, a man being stationed at nearly every farmhouse for miles around in the effort to apprehend Frank Smith, an escaped prisoner from the Portland jail, who shot Sheriff Shaver and Captain Henderson early this morning.
Sheriff Culver has given up hope of corralling the man and now trusts to his being compelled by hunger to make himself known at one of the houses within the patrolled area. Smith has not been seen since his disappearance after the encounter with Shaver's posse early this morning.

SMITH'S VICTIM DIES

One Member of the Posse Succumbs to Wounds

PORTLAND, Oregon, April 28.—A telephone message from the Associated Press correspondent at Woodburn says:
When search was made in daylight of the nursery into which Smith escaped and was supposed to be hiding, it was discovered that the man had again eluded the posse.
Smith is believed to have fled to the thickly wooded country in the vicinity of Apple creek.
The posse from Woodburn, assisted by a detachment from the Portland police department and a number of the state militia, is now scouring the country in which the man is supposed to be hiding.
A Salem special to the Telegram states that Captain O. D. Henderson, who was shot at Woodburn during the night, died at the hospital at Salem this morning.

UNCLE SAM LOSES LARGE AMOUNT

FIRE AND EARTHQUAKE COST \$3,387,630

Deficiency Estimates Forwarded to Secretary of the Treasury—Military Stores to Be Replaced

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WASHINGTON, April 28.—The secretary of war today forwarded to the secretary of the treasury for transmission to congress urgent deficiency estimates of appropriations amounting to \$3,387,630.
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The cost of replacing the medical and hospital property destroyed is placed by the surgeon general of the army at \$357,391.

VESUVIUS SPOUTS SAND AND ASHES

Awakened by Roaring Sound

NAPLES, April 28.—Another disaster has occurred in the Vesuvius region.
Throughout the past night torrents of rain fell, accompanied by a heavy gale of wind, causing large avalanches of mud, sand and ashes to fall over Soma and Santa Anastasia, destroying bridges, blocking the roads, flooding many habitations, interrupting communication by telegraph and carrying away portions of the railway.
Troops and military wagons were hurriedly dispatched to the assistance of the sufferers.
The inhabitants of the stricken places mentioned were awakened by a roaring, rushing sound which was absolutely new to them, and running out of their houses, they found their property threatened by the fall of avalanches of sand, ashes, etc. Their terror was extreme.
The women and children fled, screaming with fright, into the open country, but in spite of the avalanches, floods and gales, no loss of life had been reported up to the time this dispatch was filed.
It is believed that while the storms rage Vesuvius is liable to be a continuous menace to life and property, and that the entire region may have visitations of more or less serious nature than last night's avalanche.

POLICE OF PARIS SEARCH CITY'S HOMES

Government Papers Assert Fully Organized Plot Between Miners and Political Agitators Exists

PARIS, April 28.—The police searches and seizures continue to agitate labor and monarchist circles.
The Confederation of Labor has issued a violent protest against the action of the authorities which was to have appeared in a special edition of the Confederation's organ, the *Voix du Peuple*, but the prefect ordered the police to detain all copies of the paper.
The judicial authorities withheld all details of the seizures, but it is asserted one of the documents found at the home of an imperialist is a proclamation addressed to the army and designed to be issued after the success of the plot, and that the police also captured lists of future functionaries and ministers under the imperial regime.
The governmental organs assert that a plot between the mining agitators in the north and the political agitators in Paris was fully organized.
The strike centers are calm.

WILLIAMS CONCLUDES SPEECH

Minority Leader of the House Frequently Interrupted

WASHINGTON, April 28.—Mr. Williams, the minority leader in the house, concluded his speech began yesterday, occupying the floor for two hours.
With the experience of the many interruptions of the day before, the leader of the minority threw himself upon the mercy of the body and asked that he be not interrupted.
Generally his request was observed, but here and there questions were put to him which nettled the speaker not a little.
Mr. Williams was unable to conclude on account of a severe attack of neuralgia.
Mr. Cushman of Washington replied to Mr. Williams, but was taken off the floor before he had really got started, owing to the former action of the house agreeing to conclude general debate on the agricultural appropriation at 3:30 o'clock, at which time the house adjourned.

BOMB KILLS POLICEMAN



SENDS WIRELESS TO BOTH SHORES

OPERATOR PERFORMS AN UNUSUAL TASK

NEW YORK, April 28.—The World today says:
It is a question whether the officials of the French line are prouder of the wireless telegraph record or the speed record which their new ship *La Provence* established on her maiden trip across the Atlantic.
She arrived off Sandy Hook at 1:15 p. m. yesterday, having made the run from Havre in six days, nine hours and ten minutes.
The old record was six days, nine hours and twenty minutes, held by *La Lorraine*.
The wireless record was even more satisfactory than this.
It has been the ambition of the crack Atlantic navigators to carry on communication with both sides of the ocean at the same time, but none of them has got clear of Havre.
The ship was 1800 miles from Poldhu and 1700 miles from Cape Cod at 2 o'clock last Wednesday morning. The operators in Poldhu at that moment were sending the latest news of the San Francisco disaster to La Provence, to be published in the ship's daily newspaper.
The dots and dashes were snapping and crackling briskly and the message was flowing smoothly.
"What do you mean, Poldhu," the operator reached the end of a paragraph. The instrument was silent.
Dots and Dashes Mixed
Suddenly the dots and dashes began snapping and cracking again, but instead of earthquake news from San Francisco they were spelling out scary details about manhole covers being blown off the sewers in the New York garage district.
The operator of *La Provence* threw over his transmitting switch.
"What do you mean, Poldhu," he asked, "by mixing up messages? Go ahead with your San Francisco stuff."
"I'm not Poldhu. I'm sending from Cape Cod, in America," came the reply. "Who are you?"
Reports All Well
"This is *La Provence*, the new French liner," *La Provence* operator replied. "Report us all well. Wait a minute while I finish with Poldhu."
So the Cape Cod man kept silent until *La Provence* called him a few minutes later, but the ship's company were delighted to learn at breakfast that they had actually been in touch with both shores of the Atlantic at once.
On the return trip the operator will try again.
