

POLICE LOOKING FOR MURDERED MAN

ALLEGED WIFE-MURDERER IS SAID TO BE HERE

Eastern Officers Ask Local Police to Begin Search—Claim Man and Mother Fled to Los Angeles After Alleged Crime

Acting on the theory that Prof. Erich Muentzer, a Harvard university German instructor, charged with poisoning his young wife, is now in hiding in this city, detectives under the direction of Acting Chief Flammer are searching everywhere for the alleged murderer.

Crime is Revolving The crime for which Muentzer is wanted is said to be peculiarly revolting. It is claimed that he administered arsenic to his wife shortly after the birth of their last child.

More information about Muentzer is expected to arrive at police headquarters today from the east.


FALL THROUGH WINDOW

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
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
