FIESTA WEEK OPENS IN BLAZE OF GLORY

Flowers and Electricity Will Be Blended in Decorative and Parade Effects—Pageants, Drills, Fireworks, Dancing and Contests Will Make This a Week of Gayety

PROGRAM OF LA FIESTA DE LAS FLORES

MONDAY

Afternoon, 2 o'clock—Exhibition drills of Arab and Bedouin patrols; daylight fireworks by Japanese experts.

TUESDAY

Morning, 11 o'clock—Grand floral pageant.

WEDNESDAY

Afternoon, 12:30 o'clock—Parade of blooded horses and equipages under auspices of Los Angeles Driving club, followed by harness races.

THURSDAY

Afternoon—Water carnival at Venice, followed by concert and fireworks in evening.

ROUTES OF THE PARADES

Floral parade—Starts from Seventh and Main streets, north on Main to Temple, west to Spring, south on Spring to Ninth, west to Broadway, north on Broadway to Second, where it will disband.

Tomorrow will be the gladdest of all the year for Los Angeles people, for the Fiesta—the season of gayety and enjoyment, will open.

For months the boys and girls of Los Angeles have been exacting promises from their parents that they may remain out of school during Fiesta week and that they can stay up until 8 o'clock to watch the wonderful electric parade.

The work of the Fiesta committee is nearly over and the long weary hours which the members of it have spent convincing the merchants and business men of Los Angeles that the Fiesta will be worth their support are over.

When the last float has passed through the thronged streets, and the last band has blared its blast, then can the members of the committee sit down and congratulate themselves on their achievement.

Electricity Starts It

On Monday evening the electrical parade will first be given. The formation of it is as follows:

8 p. m.—Grand electrical parade, sixteen floats, escorted by members of Al Malaikah temple, Arab and Bedouin patrols and visiting Shriners.

Grand marshal and staff will assemble at the northwest corner of South Main and Seventh streets at 7:15 p. m.

Aides to grand marshal, Arab and Bedouin patrols and Al Malaikah temple and visiting Shriners will form on the east side of Main street, south of Seventh street, right resting on Seventh street, Colonel George Filmer, potentate of Islam temple, San Francisco, commanding Shrine division.

Noble Perry W. Weidner, commandant. Arab patrol. Bedouin patrol band. Al Malaikah temple band. Shriners' club.

TWO SHOCKS SHAKE MICHIGAN

Distinct Temblor Felt at Holland, Grand Haven, Tennyville and Bangor.

By Associated Press. GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., May 19.—Two earthquake shocks were felt in Michigan today at 3:20 o'clock this morning. Distinct shocks are reported from Holland, Grand Haven, Tennyville and Bangor.

The first shock lasted about six seconds and the second about three seconds. Residents of Holland rushed out of their houses in night attire, the quake having thrown open many doors.
