By Associated Press. ST. LOUIS, May 29.—In the heart of a lonely island in the middle of the Mississippi river, six miles above Alton, Ill., Harvey Robinson, son of John H. Robinson, a Chicago attorney, and John Murphy, a Cincinnati pugilist, fought a terrific fight yesterday afternoon.

The fight was the culmination of long standing enmity between the men, who fought with all the ferocity of enraged animals. The battle lasted four rounds.

Robinson won with a terrific blow over the right ear that sent his adversary to the ropes, over which he fell backwards and hung as if lifeless while the referee slowly counted ten. Murphy, after vigorous treatment, finally regained consciousness.

The fight was witnessed by only twenty-five spectators, who chartered a yacht at Alton to carry them to the island.

Robinson, not wishing to disclose his real identity, fought under the name of Jack Kelly of Detroit.

PHILADELPHIA, May 29.—The twenty-round fight between Bob Fitzsimmons and Tommy Burns, which was to have taken place tonight before the Tuxedo Athletic club of North Essington, ten miles from this city, has been postponed until Wednesday of this week as a result of the order issued by the governor of Pennsylvania to the state police, who have arrived at North Essington today and each was in fine fettle for the fight.

The postponement of the fight was a great disappointment to thousands of followers of the sport, many of whom had come from other cities to see the fight.

UNION WATER SCHEME PASADENA AND ENVIRONS DEBATE ANNEXATION

Delegates From Four Cities Commend Los Angeles' Enterprise, but Leave Consolidation Question Open for the Present

Resolved, by the citizens of Pasadena, Alhambra and Long Beach, in meeting assembled this 29th day of May, 1906, that an added water supply for Southern California is highly important and urgent, and this meeting heartily commends the enterprise of Los Angeles in the purpose to bring a large supply of water from the Colorado mountains to the city.

Resolved, That inasmuch as the co-operation of other towns and outside territory in this project has been held out as a desideratum, it is the sense of this meeting that such co-operation should not be inquired of until a plan of city and county government had uniting in metropolitan water districts or under some other form of organization, it is best to abstain from making the choice now, but to leave as many avenues of choice open as possible.

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their credit, proceeded to draft an entirely new resolution. The resolution when presented fifteen minutes later commended Los Angeles for its activity in securing the Owens River water, favored consolidation of tax assessing machines, etc., but opposed any further consolidation of any sort at this time.

Another View. Others followed and finally Judge J. G. Rossiter took up the matter with-out gloves. He demanded to know how many in the audience knew just what was proposed in the matter of consolidation and said that it looked to him like the story of the Irishman who on coming to this country said he did not know what was the government, but at any rate he was "agin it."

The speaker appeared to please the crowd and a motion was made to refer the resolution back to the committee for amendment. This was done and when the committee again reported its resolution read as given first above.

According to the suggestion of a speaker from Long Beach some form of permanent organization for mutual support in the water proposition was needed.

Mr. Nichols of Pasadena before the meeting adjourned moved that the resolution committee as previously appointed be made permanent for this purpose and this was done.

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
