De Longpre's Composition, Written Under Inspiration, Has a Triumphant Finale—Will Be Heard at Elks' Hall This Afternoon

M. Jean de Chauvenet will play at Elks' hall this afternoon at 3 o'clock the first funeral march composed for the victims of the great disaster at San Francisco.

While the first strains are sad, the march has a unique feature different from all others, that the finale is triumphant in its grandiose sostenuto effect, which bespeaks of the rise of a new city on the ruins of the old, as well as the joy and felicity of the souls of those who lost their lives in the catastrophe.

M. De Longpre, who composed the march, writes his music entirely under inspiration. While studying his beautiful flowers in his garden a musical thought would suddenly come to him and he would write it down immediately. It is thus that his music has made him a musical favorite, as well as an artistic one.

Many prominent bands of the country have played his compositions with marked effect.

The march was arranged by M. De Chauvenet. The success of his personality in musical thought has brought for the professor much comment in the newspapers, especially of his superb octave work and brilliant fingering.

In "The Intellectual Miss Lamb" Florence Morse Kingsley has added another to her creations of "modified spinsters," as some one has cleverly characterized the characters giving title to her recent books. It is a love story of an "old maid" interested in physiological psychology, an obstetrical infant, and one "Billy," the man in the case. Mrs. Kingsley is authority for the statement that "the Intellectual Miss Lamb" has no exact prototype in real life—although the father of an instructor of psychology in one of the best known women's colleges thought he recognized the sketch as a portrait of his daughter. The character and the story grew out of a recent visit to Wellesley college, an hour's idle review of a treatise on physiological pathology, and the vague remembrance of a bewitchingly pretty "grind," who was a fellow student of the author's at Wellesley.

The Intellectual Miss Lamb. By Florence Morse Kingsley. New York: The Century company.

Middleton which aims to do what "Oliver Twist" did for Humbleton, what "Uncle Tom's Cabin" did for slavery, to the forces which now oppose the social emancipation of the people." It is a prophetic view of conditions which it is hoped will result in the freeing of all men from the domination of others. The single axis is the struggle for all men and it hopes to see the end of all wealth-accumulation, the holding of all things in common and a lot of other Utopian dreams that would upset the established order of the universe and make chaos of all man has done since the ages began. Like all other such books, it is as impracticable as it is undesirable.
