Ah Wing Loses to Caesar Attel When Sponge is Thrown into Ring. Walsh Brothers Win

Van Court, the veteran instructor of the San Francisco club, was behind his protegee and throughout the ten rounds entered into the proceedings. When Baker hesitated too long before the charging Dalton it was "move around Harry" from Van Court.

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Walsh was Irish, but it was a Celt's blood flowing over his own shoulder as he clashed with a good heavy boxer.

LONDON, June 19.—Although robbed of its picturesque state procession on account of the absence of Queen Alexandra, who is still in mourning, the prince of Wales, in Norway, and the duke of Connaught, who is also in mourning, the royal Ascot, England's greatest social race meeting, presented its usual brilliant scene at the opening of the meeting today.

The king drove with his guests in carriages throughout the great park of Ascot. There was a great gathering of Americans and Anglo-Americans at the meeting. The Americans who were invited to the royal inclosure were Ambassador Reid, Mrs. Reid, Secretary Carter of the American embassy, Mrs. Carter and Miss Carter, Maj. John H. Beacom, the American military attaché; Second Secretary Craig W. Wadsworth, Congressman Nicholas Longworth and Mrs. Longworth, Ogden Mills, the Misses Mills, J. White and Miss Muriel White, the son and daughter of the ambassador at Rome; Mrs. Charles H. Marshall, Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt, Miss Gladys Vanderbilt, Dorothy Whitney, Mr. and Mrs. Anthony J. Drexel and Mr. and Mrs. John G. Drexel.

The racing was interesting, as in most cases the results were regarded as open and there were several close finishes.
