

JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER'S OFFER IS REFUSED

Judge Lindsey Turns Down \$5,000,000 Pledge

No Tainted Money Wanted for the Juvenile Association

Miss Jane Addams Declares She Would Not Assist in Work if Rockefeller Millions Were Accepted

Special to The Herald. DENVER, June 25.—Before the organization of the International Juvenile Improvement association at Chicago a few days ago, Judge Lindsey of the juvenile court at Denver, the nestor of the movement, gave a pledge that he would refuse John D. Rockefeller's offer of \$5,000,000 to finance it.

The offer of the oil magnate was made to Judge Lindsey through his secretary last summer, Judge Lindsey having made the trip to New York on Mr. Rockefeller's invitation. It was a condition of the Rockefeller donation that the movement be given an international character and it was Judge Lindsey's intention that this step should be taken at the national convention of charities and corrections at Philadelphia.

COURT DECIDES AGAINST TRUST

LOUIS, June 25.—In the circuit court today Judge Ryan, decided in favor of a purchaser, who contended that he does not have to pay for goods which he voluntarily bought from a concern, which, he alleges, is a member of a so-called trust. The Cahill-Scott Manufacturing company had brought suit for \$340 against Joseph E. Walsh on the allegation that Walsh had bought goods to the value of the judgment asked and had refused to pay for them.

SAUSAGE MAKERS WARNED

New York Board of Health Tells Manufacturers to Leave Out Preservatives. NEW YORK, June 25.—Within the last two weeks it is learned about fifty manufacturers of sausages have been called before the board of health and have been warned that they will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law if they do not at once comply with the provisions of the code and manufacture their product without a preservative.

MINING SHARKS MAKE BIG HAUL

Americans Who Do the Angling, However, Land in Jail—Represent Themselves as Extensive Promoters. LONDON, June 25.—At the opening of the prosecution today in behalf of the treasury at the guild hall police court the case of Mark Anthony Young and Henry Jonas, local managers of the American Mining, Milling and Smelting syndicate, who were arrested June 18 on the charge of conspiracy to defraud the public by selling valueless shares, R. D. Muler, counsel for the treasury, said evidence in the hands of the police indicated that serious frauds had been committed.

Since January 19 the country has been flooded with fiery advertisements of the American Mining, Milling and Smelting company, purporting to own mines in Alaska, California, Utah, Colorado and Mexico, which were paying 185 per cent interest.

Documents sent broadcast announced that the net profits of the company for nine years were upwards of \$27,500,000 and that dividends totaling \$12,500,000 had been paid.

CASH WORTHLESS CHECKS

Many Bakersfield Citizens Taken In by Former Employe of Union Oil Company. BAKERSFIELD, Cal., June 25.—Three saloon men, a cigar stand owner, a meat dealer and Sheriff Kelly are hard after one C. D. Loomis, a discharged employe of the Union Oil company, well known here, who since Saturday night has given \$120 worth of valueless checks drawn to his account in the Bank of Bakersfield.

TERRORISTS KILL TWO DETECTIVES

SAYS HOOSIERS DOPE MEAT

State Officials of Indiana Make Investigation and Prosecutions Will Follow. INDIANAPOLIS, June 25.—Dr. J. N. Hurley, secretary of the state board of health, and H. R. Barnard, chemist of the state board, acting on the advice of Dr. T. FLOODS DESTROY RIGHT FARM LAND

UNION ISLAND IS SWEEPED BY OVERFLOW

MURDERS EMINENT CLUB MAN

Harry Thaw Shoots Stanford White

Automatic Revolver Deals Death at New York Roof Garden

Husband of Evelyn Nesbitt, the Actress, Declares the Man He Shot Ruined His Wife

NEW YORK, June 25.—Stanford White, the eminent architect of the firm of McKim, Mead & White, was shot tonight and almost instantly killed by Harry Thaw, a member of the well-known Pittsburg family, during the performance of the musical extravaganza "Mamselle Champagne," on the roof of the Madison Square Garden.

Mr. White died before an ambulance could be summoned and Thaw was arrested immediately after the shooting.

The Madison Square roof garden, which has been closed for several years, was crowded tonight with a fashionable audience. While Harry Thaw, who fills the principal comedy role in the piece, was singing a comic song and the garden was echoing with the laughter and applause of the audience, a series of shots rattled in the rear of the auditorium and a man in evening dress was seen to fall across a table at which he was sitting with a party of friends.

Instantly the great audience was thrown into a panic and a wild stampede occurred during which chairs and tables were overturned and men and women fought with desperation to escape from the roof.

The man who was shot was quickly identified as Mr. White, but his assailant was not positively known to be Thaw until after he had been taken to the station house.

Persons in front of the auditorium where the tragedy occurred say that they saw a man sitting with a fashionably dressed woman in the rear suddenly walk down toward a table in front.

The first intimation of trouble came when, walking in front of his seated victim, the man exclaimed: "You've ruined my home," and drawing an automatic pistol fired three times. The first two took effect, but as the third was discharged the pistol was struck up by a fireman on duty in the theater and the man went skyward.
