LOOKS FOR 85,000

VOTERS ON LISTS

Sixth Ward Has More Than Doubled Since Last Election—Politicians Figure on 40,000 Votes at Coming Balloting

According to County Clerk Keyes, the registration of voters in the city and county promises to run in surprisingly large totals.

From the figures at hand he estimates that the total will approximate \$5,000.

September 26, 1904, the city had 42,576 registered voters.

July 1, 1906, the total registration was 54,602, or an increase of 12,076.

More than 50,000 citizens will be eligible to vote at the coming primaries.

The largest increase is in the Sixth ward, which has more than doubled since the last registration.

The Fourth ward ranks second in point of gain.

Politicians are figuring on getting out a vote of at least 40,000 in the city and county at the coming elections.
