COLLEGE ATHLETICS RECEIVE THE BACK

CONTINUED WRANGLING IS HUMOROUS

Representatives Rapidly Force Situation to Point Where Ridiculous Phase is Foremost—Facilities Object

As was not altogether unexpected, representatives of the local college athletic world have again enacted a comedy entrance which has made temporary exit during recent years.

With St. Vincent's barred out, U. S. C. refusing to consider the latest proposition of Occidental and Pomona and the latter colleges smiling at one another after a "real meat" split up last season, the situation takes that spicy stage which has so often preceded a wearisome round of quibbling.

Irreparable injury has been directed at Southern California college athletics by incompetent "boltons" or youths lacking the foresight which would overlook mere personal gain in an endeavor to raise the general standard of athletics.

A surprising feature of the situation lies in the fact that an agreement fails to all might be attained without the slightest difficulty, provided each of the four colleges were so inclined and level-headed young men detailed to perfect an organization.

Whenever wrangling has occurred athletics suffered severely and little or no disturbance results in the big college circles of the east, where men are wont to go out and contest without a long period of verbal preparation that is bound to dim half the interest which might have been aroused in a knowledge that teams were going forth for pure sport's sake and a love of the game.

Southern California college athletics are necessarily far from perfect, but methods employed so far have tended to shadow public interest. After the recent meeting between U. S. C., Pomona and Occidental, several faculty members expressed an intention of frowning upon all athletics should another season of wrangling occur.

If student representatives find it impossible to agree upon some remedy a final agreement between the several faculties would receive hearty support.

The six-round bout between Benny Hart and Frank Gordon was declared a draw though Hart outpointed Gordon all the way.

TOURING PARTY STARTS NORTH

WINTON GARAGE IS NEARING COMPLETION Rambler Agent Will Leave for the East—Reo Machines Arrive

With the return of several motor parties from the north, others are leaving daily upon fall tours. Up state roads are in better condition than general trend of northern touring.

Mr. Bruno Enderline and wife left yesterday morning with their light Reo motor car, prepared for a journey to San Francisco and the surrounding country. A goodly supply of provisions entered into the equipment and the car will be used as a diner as well as a Pullman.

W. K. Cowan will leave Friday, for the Rambler factory at Kenosha, Wis., where he will negotiate for early shipment.

The shipments of Rambler, model 20, 1907, surreys arrived yesterday at the local garage. With a detachable tonneau, the machine is easily converted into a powerful runabout for which there is such a steady demand at the present time.

The first shipment of Rambler runabouts will leave the factory by September 15, reaching Los Angeles before the first of October.

Awaiting the completion of their new garage at Elco and Hill streets, Winton people are making arrangements for the new cars which will be received. At present there is a dearth of motors at the Hill street salesrooms, but a handsome lot will arrive in time for the opening of the new garage, which is expected to occur about September 20.

AMERICAN BOATS FINISH FIRST

GERMAN YACHTSMEN STILL CONFIDENT

The Vim, Owned by T. L. Park of the New York Yacht Club, Finishes in Lead, With Caramba One Minute Behind Winner

By Associated Press. MARBLEHEAD, Mass., Sept. 5.—Three American boats sailed across the finish line in today's race for the Roosevelt cup well in advance of the three German challengers.

The Vim, designed by William Gardner and owned by Commander T. L. Park of the American Yacht club of New York, won the contest through her brilliant windward work, coupled with splendid running qualities.

Clifford Buckman, her amateur skipper, sailed the craft perfectly the second time over the course, though he lost during the first time by taking a long hitch in shore with the tide.

The Caramba, owned by C. H. W. Foster, was the second boat, finishing thirty-two seconds behind the Vim, while the Auk, winner of Monday's race, was third to finish, twenty-two seconds behind the Caramba.

Of the three German challengers the Wannasse did the best work, but at that not one of them seemed to have a chance with the American yachts.

The Wannasse finished the race three minutes and twenty seconds behind the Vim and was thirty-seven seconds ahead of the Gloucester IV, the fifth racer to finish.

Tilly VI had bad luck on the first leg to windward, getting into all the soft spots. She was an even nine minutes behind the Vim at the end of the race.

The German yachtsmen expressed themselves as much surprised at the results of the two races that have been sailed, but do not admit yet that their chances of lifting the Roosevelt cup are gone. They said they would be in tomorrow's race and hoped to make a good showing.

BATTLING NELSON CONFINED TO BED

DEFEATED PUGILIST IS STILL SUFFERING

Siler Defends His Decision and Gans Declares He Will Dictate Terms to Nolan Next Time

Nolan and Nelson are still claiming they were robbed of the fight, but they get little sympathy. George Siler, referee, said today: "Nelson needn't whine about getting the worst of it. He got the best of it all the way through. There were twenty times when I could have called foul on him, but I wanted the crowd to watch the fight, and as the fouls were of no serious consequence I let them go with a warning."

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
