JUROR'S ACTION CALMS CROWDS

MOBILE WILL RUSH TRIALS OF NEGROES

Killing of Deputy in Night Attack on Bastille Brings Lawlessness in the Gulf City to a Head

By Associated Press. MOBILE, Ala., Oct. 3.—Mobile passed a day of great excitement after the incidents of last night, when a mob went to the county jail to get the negro, Dick alias Cornelius Robinson, charged with assault upon the little Sossaman girl, and some persons unknown fired guns through the opening at the jail and killed Special Deputy Roy Hoyle.

There is another negro in jail in Birmingham, Will Thompson, who probably would have been lynched here about a month ago had the mob been able to get hold of him.

This evening a meeting was held near the jail and a committee investigated the jail and reported that the negro was not there. The crowd dispersed.

About the same hour the grand jury in session brought in indictments against both negroes and set their trial, that of Thompson for next Wednesday and of Robinson for next Thursday. This, becoming known, had a calming effect upon the crowd.

A leading negro citizen, James T. Peterson, today published an address to the public stating that the best negroes repudiated the strongest manner the awful crimes committed by members of their race, and that they will do all they can to bring the criminals to justice.

EVEN FAIR LILLIAN YIELDS UP GEMS

Policy King Suffered From Diabetes and Was Much Depressed of Late

Adams, who was found dead Monday with a bullet wound in the head, declare that after a full and careful investigation they are of the belief that not a single factor in the circumstances warranted any suspicion of murder.

Information coming to them showed that Mr. Adams had given way to depression within the last week, although he had concealed that fact from his family, and it was all due to the unfavorable turn taken by diabetes, with which he had long been afflicted.

Huntington a Builder

LEONCAVALLO PAYS AMERICA A VISIT

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—With a new march called "Viva l'America" in his portmanteau, composed in commemoration of his visit to this country, Ruggero Leoncavallo, the composer of "I Pagliacci" and other operas, who is considered one of the greatest of living writers of musical scores, arrived on the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse.

A man of universal artistic renown and an attractive personality, his coming is an event of great importance to the music loving public.

The "maestro," as he is known wherever Italian opera is heard, will make a tour of the United States and Canada at the head of the Scala orchestra of Milan.

Leoncavallo is a democratic man, brimming over with good humor, and was lionized all the way over by the passengers. Speaking of his visit he said:

"My visit to America has more significance to me than a mere tour. It is my purpose while here to get the material for at least one opera based on American life.

"I want to go to the theaters to see the people and meet and talk with them, to learn their ideas and ideals, and see if I can write them into words and music.

"I have not studied so much of the American literature as I could wish, but believe after all it was better for me to learn at first hand by meeting the people."
