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GREAT AUTO RACE EXCITES INTEREST

AMERICANS PLACE RELIANCE UPON TWO CARS Joe Tracy is Expected to Be the Strongest Contender Against Foreign Drivers in the Contest

Automobilists throughout the world are waiting anxiously today for tidings of the great Vanderbilt cup race which occurs on Long Island with the most powerful and swiftest machines of modern ingenuity entered.

In the two previous races France has carried off the chief honors, but this year both Italy and American will make a big fight to win this much coveted prize.

Under the conditions of the contest the cars will have to make ten circuits of a 29.71 mile course, and the car making the fastest elapsed time will be declared the winner of the race.

This year France will be represented by Albert Clement, in a Clement-Bayard car; Wagner, in a Darracq; Heath, in a Panhard, and Dury, in the De Dietrich, which averaged sixty-six miles an hour over the Ardenne circuit.

Italy will pin its faith in Lancia, Nazzaro and Dr. Wellshoff, who will drive Fiat, and Fabry and Cagno, who will pilot Italian cars.

Lancia, who averaged seventy miles an hour for three-quarters of the distance last year, is the public favorite for the race, but in all probability he will be beaten out by Nazzaro, a less spectacular but more careful driver.

So far as America is concerned it will be represented by Tracy, in a locomobile; Le Blon, in a Thomas; Harding, in a Haynes; Lowell, in a Prayer-Miller, and Christie, in his front drive Christie touring car.

On paper American cars seem only to have been made that Joe Tracy of Le Blon have a look in, but at that many wagers have been made that Le Blon will land a place in the final race.

So far as the other cars are concerned their only chance seems to be for the other cars to break down, as they do not possess the requisite speed to beat the foreigners.

The three Mercedes cars which Janetzky, Foxhall Keene and Lutigen will drive, while powerful enough in their way, do not seem to have the speed of the French or Italian cars, and while they will probably make a good showing, it is doubtful if any one of them can win the race.

FOOTBALL SEASON OPENS TODAY

U. S. C. AND HIGH SCHOOL TEAMS TO MEET

University Men May Be Given a Surprise by Active Academics—College Eleven Will Not Use Forward Pass

For the first time in months the referee's whistle will call time on a Los Angeles gridiron this afternoon, and the competing elevens are to be the University of Southern California and Los Angeles high school teams, which meet at 2:30 o'clock on the Fiesta park field.

Owing to the fact that secretive methods have been observed by local coaches during the preliminary practice games, there is not much room for a line on what the outcome of today's battle may be.

The university men are expected to possess the usual advantage of weight, but judging from the racy play of the high school men Coach Holmes' team may have a very strenuous period after the whistle sounds.

Bill Traeger, formerly of Stanford, has been working with the academic boys, and if he is capable of imparting anywhere near the knowledge which he possesses the Methodists should be given a lively session.

It is not known whether the much vaunted forward pass will feature this afternoon's contest. Holmes declares that he does not intend using the innovation, as too much risk is involved.

Although considerable secrecy has hovered about the university training, there is reason to believe that something new in the defensive line will be seen this afternoon. Peepers through university fence holes claim that Holmes has devised a defense which is entirely new hereabouts, and predict that it will prove something of a stumbling block when used against the high school boys.

It has not been decided what men shall enter the game on either side and there will probably be many changes before the halves are completed.

Hazberty of St. Vincent's, Hamilton of Harvard military school and Traeger will act as officials.
