BID 110,000 SHRINERS TO VISIT LOS ANGELES

Al Malaikah Temple Sends Invitation Broadcast Over America for the Big 1907 Meeting—All the Western Records of Travel Will Probably Be Broken Here Next May

Within sixty days 110,000 Shriners in America will have received invitations inviting them to come to Los Angeles in May, 1907.

Al Malaikah temple, at an expense of \$5000 for postage, printing, typewriting and labor, will mail these invitations far and wide, and experts say the literature will be as fine advertising for sunny Southern California as could be devised.

The invitations will contain return postal cards, by means of which it can be determined in advance how many visitors will come to Los Angeles next May.

Advance letters received show that the attendance next year will double that which was anticipated in 1906; and it can be positively stated at this time that more special trains will cross the continent to the Fiesta and imperial council Shrine meeting than to any other event ever held in the west.

Chairman M. H. Flint states that next week the full committee which will have charge of Shriner entertainments will be announced.

Letters to Nobles
The following letter addressed to the nobles accompanies each invitation: "Great was your disappointment and our sorrow when that circumstances arose which rendered it necessary to postpone the meeting of the imperial council originally planned to be held in this city until May, 1907. The executive committee had worked nearly one full year in the preparation of a splendid entertainment for the visiting nobles and ladies, and contracts aggregating over \$50,000 had been entered into; consequently it was necessary that the night electrical parade and La Fiesta de los Flores (the Feast of Flowers) take place the same as if the imperial council had been held in this city, and the illustrations shown in this program are a few of the official entries in the electrical and floral parades. For the entertainment next May entirely new details will be arranged,

and while our last effort was most beautiful, we promise to far excel when you are with us to enjoy the magnificence and splendor of our Oriental and floral pageants.

"Please remember that the entire program as outlined provides for entertainment entirely free, and that Al Malaikah temple is eagerly awaiting the opportunity of greeting you in sunny Southern California and giving you a true Arabian welcome.

"Tour in the faith, M. H. FLINT, Chairman Executive Committee."

Here is the official program, subject only to such slight changes as the circumstances may require:

Sunday, May 5
Arrival of representatives on special trains bearing delegates to the thirty-third annual session of the imperial council, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. All special trains will be met by reception committees. Escort for Arab patrols and nobles from depots to hotels will be by Al Malaikah Arab patrol of Los Angeles, Al Malaikah Bedouin patrol of Los Angeles and Islam patrol of San Francisco. Ladies accompanying special trains will be taken to hotels in automobiles, tally-hos and special cars. Baggage to be immediately transferred by special wagons to hotels. Special trains running to Los Angeles via San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake railroad will be met at Riverside by nobles of that city bearing gifts of fruit and flowers, which will be distributed to visitors.

Monday, May 6
Special excursions for the imperial council (officers and representatives) and their ladies to Avalon, Catalina Island. This trip will take the entire day and will be one of rare pleasure and enjoyment. Special boat provided for the sole use of the imperial council, in which our Venice secured its name. Opening of the mid-summer water carnival. Elaborate entertainment will

be provided. On the Midway many new shows will be open for the entertainment of our visitors, which will be free to nobles and ladies. Ballroom, pension and parachute jump. Exhibition of high diving and fancy swimming. Race in gondolas by two famous gondoliers.

Evening: Grand concert, vocal and instrumental, in the Venetian gardens. Nobles and ladies on entering concert hall will receive a souvenir of Venice. Wonderful water carnival. Glorious electrical illuminations. Magnificent fireworks. Positively the most gorgeous spectacle ever attempted on the Pacific coast.

Monday evening: Islam Temple will hold a reception and concert at the headquarters of the temple, King Edward hotel, corner Fifth and Los Angeles streets, from 8:30 to 11:30 p. m. Nobles and their ladies cordially invited.

Tuesday, May 7
9 a. m.: Imperial council (officers and representatives), accompanied by all visiting patrols and the Arab and Bedouin patrols of Los Angeles, to the opening session at the Scottish Rite cathedral; procession to start from the Alexandria hotel, headquarters of the imperial council. All patrols to be on hand promptly at the hour named. Patrols not accompanied by bands will be provided with music by the executive committee.

Afternoon, 2:30: Typical California banquet given to and in honor of the imperial council at the banquet room of the Scottish Rite cathedral. Dishes served distinctive of the Golden State. Excursion to Pasadena, the "Crown of the Valley," said by tourists to be the most beautiful city in Southern California. Nobles and their ladies will be met by a reception committee of Pasadena Shriners and entertained in the true Arabian way.

Evening: Grand parade of imperial council, Arab patrols and Shriners acting as escort to the electrical Turkish and Moorish pageant. Full details of the parade will be given to all visitors in ample time to participate therein. It is earnestly desired by Al Malaikah temple that all members of the imperial council and every member of the Shrine in Los Angeles on that evening will participate in this parade. Uniforms for the Shriners will be dress suit and fez.

As the parade disbands all Arab patrols will march direct to Levy's banquet room, Third and Main streets, to be the guests of the Arab and Bedouin patrols of Los Angeles, where, under their direction, a genuine California banquet will be served. Every dish on the menu typical of the Golden State.

Wednesday, May 8
Business session of the imperial council. Automobile and tally-ho rides

around the city. All automobiles and tally-hos will start from Alexandria hotel, beginning at 8 a. m. and continue uninterruptedly until night. Our visitors will please understand that it will not be possible for all to take the ride at the same time, but ample automobiles and tally-hos will be provided and an opportunity will be given at some time during the day for all to have a ride around the city.

3 p. m.: Exhibition drill by all Arab patrols in Ascot park. Don't fail to visit Ascot park, which is said to be the finest and most up-to-date racing park in the United States. All patrols participating will be presented with a magnificent trophy.

Immediately following the exhibition drills there will be a magnificent exhibition of Japanese daylight fireworks, especially designed and made to order for this occasion in Japan. This will be one of the most interesting and picturesque events of the week.

Evening: Second grand parade of the electrical Turkish and Moorish pageant. Theater parties—Orpheum theater, first-class vaudeville; Belasco theater, first-class attraction, either comedy or drama. Al Malaikah temple has purchased all seats in both theaters for Wednesday evening, May 8, and Thursday evening, May 9. Any seat, including box seats in either house, free to nobles and their ladies.

Thursday, May 9
Special excursion for all Arab patrols to Avalon, Catalina Island. This trip will take the entire day and will be one of rare pleasure and enjoyment for all. Special boats provided for the sole use of Arab patrols.

Special excursion to Long Beach, where the local Shriners of that city have prepared an elaborate program. Concert by Royal Italian band in Auditorium. Ocean ride, giving all nobles and ladies view of harbor, breakwater and United States war vessels; exclusive use of steamers; automobile rides over city and beach; exhibition and drill of life-saving crew. Courtship of Long Beach bath house, the finest and most complete on the coast, reserved exclusively for nobles and their ladies. Continuous lunch will be served in the Sun parlor at end of pier; brilliant electrical illuminations of pier, auditorium, bath house and streets.

Evening: Third and last parade of the electrical Turkish and Moorish pageant. Theater parties—Orpheum theater, first-class vaudeville; Belasco theater, first-class attraction, either comedy or drama. Any seat, including box seats, in either house, free to visiting nobles and their ladies.

Friday evening: Grand Shrine ball at Al Malaikah new auditorium, a one hundred and fifty thousand dollar structure to be erected and completed for that event. It is expected that the auditorium will seat 5000, with banquet accommodations for 3000.

Saturday, May 11
9 a. m.: Great Spanish barbecue and bullhead breakfast at San Gabriel—unique and typical Spanish dishes will be served to 10,000 visitors. Do not fail to be present and participate in this popular entertainment. Remember the chili con carne and the frijoles. You may not have heard of them, but you will like them if you will give these great Spanish dishes a trial. Following the barbecue and bullhead breakfast, cowboys from the ranges of Arizona, New Mexico and California will give a true western exhibition of steer roping, bronco busting and horsemanship. The barbecue will take place on the grounds of the Southern California Masonic home, a splendid institution which every noble should visit.

Within a short distance from the point where the barbecue will be held is found the world-famous San Gabriel mission. This was the fourth mission established by the Franciscan fathers and was founded September 8, 1771. Admission to the mission is entirely reserved for nobles and their ladies on Saturday, May 11.
