

SENATOR RAYNER SCORES TRUSTS WOULD REARRANGE PRESENT TARIFF

Speech at Baltimore Described as Probably the Most Important of the Democratic Congressional Campaign

BALTIMORE, Oct. 26.—Before an audience which filled the Lyric last night United States Senator Isidor Rayner delivered what will prove, perhaps, the most important speech of the Democratic congressional campaign in this state.

“I am not a revolutionist on the subject of the tariff and I would not destroy or impair a single business interest in this country that was making a legitimate profit out of its enterprise, but I am an inveterate enemy of the colossal combinations that are making their own prices for the American consumer, and who no longer require the protection of the government for their support.”

“The United States steel trust can go to Canada, Mexico or any place else, paying the freight and undersell the foreign market, and here it declares it cannot compete with the foreign market and is given a prohibitive duty of forty per cent ad valorem to keep the foreign product from our shores.”

“You will readily understand why there are so many of these trust combinations in the land, nearly 300, alphabetically arranged, their capital amounted to about \$300,000,000 before the Dingley tariff bill was passed. Now, based on the reciprocity fraud and the prohibitive provisions of the bill, it is more than six billion.”

“The president says we ought not to interfere with the tariff on these trusts because it might affect the profit of the individual enterprises that are in competition with them.”

“With great respect, what a perfect farce this is! There are no private enterprises in competition with them. There are any wonder that the president is not in favor of the bill prohibiting corporations from contributing to federal elections? It passed the senate unanimously, but met a quietus in the house of representatives. It would never have done to pass this bill before an election, because where would the funds come from that would enable the Republican party to carry the elections?”

“This bill would have been a great blessing to the country and I am anxious to see at the next session of congress whether, as Speaker Cannon said, that body will be in a sufficiently judicial frame of mind to pass this enactment.”

UTE INDIANS SEEKING AID

By Associated Press. OMAHA, Oct. 26.—A special to the World Herald from Cheyenne, Wyo., says: Word reaches here that the Utes are now moving and are headed northwest toward the northern Cheyennes, whose reservation lies about fifty miles east of Fort Custer, Montana.

Last night 12,000 rounds of ammunition were shipped from Fort McKenzie to Major Grierson, who is in command of the Tenth cavalry. He is now at Gillette, whence he is expected today to go by rail over the Burlington to Arivada, which will bring him within about fifty miles of the Utes.

Col. Rogers, in command of the Sixth cavalry at Fort Meade, has not been heard from, but is expected as early as Sunday after the two commands will reach the Indians where a co-operation is expected between the two regiments of cavalry.

In the two commands there are ten troops of cavalry, about 500 men, besides the officers and teamsters. Additional supplies have been forwarded to both commands.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 26.—Five bodies were recovered today from the ruins of the Chamber of Commerce building in Kansas City, Kan., which was destroyed by fire yesterday, and it is now known that at least eight persons lost their lives in the fire.

The body of Charles Lynch, a laborer, was recovered today. The bodies of Edward W. Wallow, his wife and two daughters, were recovered earlier in the day. Eight persons are still missing.

The body found yesterday and supposed to be that of D. R. Young was today positively identified as the remains of Patrick McGuire, aged 65, a retired locomotive engineer.

PROSPECTORS EAGER TO FILE CLAIMS

New Territory to Be Opened in Nevada Attracts Old-Time Miners and Other Adventurous Spirits

YERINGTON, Nev., via Schurz, Nev., Oct. 26.—Tremendous excitement prevails at this point in the northwestern side of Walker lake, where between 3000 and 4000 eager men have gathered preparatory to rushing on Walker Indian reservation, a large portion of which will be thrown open at noon on Monday next.

Camps have been established at all advantageous points in this vicinity and the prospective claimants for mine locations are ready to rush to spots where the richest mineral land is supposed to be.

Several large copper mines are in successful operation near Yerington, a few miles outside the reservation boundaries, and local traditions credit the territory inside the reservation as being still richer.

It is feared by some that bloodshed may result over disputes that are almost certain to occur over specially favored locations. This mushroom mining camp presents a spectacle of appearance. Although the majority of those who are here for the rush are seasoned miners, a large number have had no experience in mining whatever.

A great percentage of the prospectors are from California, although Goldfield, Tonopah and other Nevada mining towns have contributed the largest quota. Men are also here from nearly all the large eastern cities.

Mining syndicates have their representatives who are instructed to secure as many claims as possible. Accommodations of all kinds are at a high premium. While no hardship has been experienced as yet, it is believed much suffering may result unless more provisions are rushed in.

The camp at Yerington was swelled by about 600 additional people today and several thousand are expected tomorrow. Conveyances of all kinds have been chartered and a high price has been placed on horses. The poorest kind of an animal brings a large sum. The lines of the reservation near Yerington and Schurz are being carefully guarded by mounted police.

Early this morning a party of five prospectors made a bold dash into the reservation, but they had gone but a few miles before they were overtaken and summarily ejected. They were informed that they would not be allowed to locate on the reservation and were ordered to leave the country under threat of arrest.

HOOPER CONSISTS STATEMENT IS TRUE

POPE PIUS X RECEIVES HERR VON TSCHIRSKY

By Associated Press. ROME, Oct. 26.—Pope Pius X today received the German foreign secretary, Herr von Tschirsky, and Frau von Tschirsky, who were accompanied by the Prussian minister to the Vatican, Baron von Rotenhan.

In the papal antechamber von Tschirsky met Cardinal Agliardi, vice chancellor of the holy Roman church, who formerly was papal nuncio at Munich, and therefore is thoroughly conversant with the reservation, who had been received by the pope previous to the arrival of the German foreign secretary. Cardinal Agliardi had a brief conference with the foreign secretary, after which the latter was admitted to the papal library.
