

SEAMAN KILLED BY JAPANESE
FIGHT ENDS IN DEATH OF THE MATE

Officer of Schooner Tries to Quiet the Boisterous Conduct of the Cabin Boy and is Stabbed

LONG BEACH, Nov. 3.—Ivor Hansen, second officer on the schooner William F. Garms, was assaulted and killed about 5:15 o'clock this afternoon on board his vessel, which lies alongside the Crescent dock at West Long Beach. His assailants were three Japanese—T. Kitanko, cabin boy on the schooner, and S. Fogolka and F. Amigochin, employees in Los Angeles boarding houses, who came to visit Kitanko this morning and celebrate with him the mate's birthday.

The murder followed an attempt by Hansen to quiet the three Japanese, who were acting in a boisterous manner. Kitanko struck at the mate and was knocked down. He bit Hansen in the leg as he fell, then bit one of his thumbs and finally, rising to his feet, bit the man's nose. Amigochin felt Hansen to the deck with a blow upon the head with a club, fracturing his skull. Fogolka also stabbed the mate in the left side, causing a severe wound. Kitanko bit off a portion of Hansen's nose and one of the Jap's gold teeth was broken off in the mixup.

Kitanko ran across and hid on the schooner Talbot. Fogolka tried to hide amidst the lumber piles on the dock. Officers Roy Taylor and Fred Phillips, who had been attracted to the scene by the fight, caught him, however, and turning him over to people standing near hastened aboard the William F. Garms and rescued Amigochin from members of the crew, who were handling him roughly. Kitanko was easily captured and the three Japs were handcuffed together and brought to Long Beach on the Salt Lake train tonight. They were lodged in the city prison.

BELL ANSWERS MR. GILLETT
LATTER'S CHARGES DENIED IN FULL

Democratic Nominee for Governor Declares Statements Sent Broad-cast Are Absolutely Without Foundation

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 3.—Theodore A. Bell, the Democratic nominee for governor, has asked the Associated Press to circulate the following answer to charges made by Mr. Gillett in dispatches recently published:

"Mr. Gillett makes a very serious charge when he declares that I am charged with the administration of the state by the same influences which now control San Francisco. Such an accusation is absolutely without foundation and comes with very bad grace from one who owes his nomination to Herrin, Ruef and Schmitz.

"Both Ruef and Schmitz exacted from Gillett at the time they made it possible for him to be nominated the entire water front patronage of San Francisco, including the appointment of those from whom he received the laws of the state, and if they have transgressed the laws I shall use my influence and official position to bring them to a speedy justice.

"I refuse to pronounce them criminals until proof is submitted to me, for I have never yet prejudged any living soul and I refuse to do so now, no matter what bearing it may have upon my election. If guilty they need expect no mercy at my hands, but if not guilty no amount of public clamor can lead me to do them or any other man an injustice.

"I demand that Mr. Gillett explain his anomalous position of condemning those to whom he owes his nomination and those from whom he still hopes for material assistance in his election. His unwarranted criticism of me only convicts him of inconsistency and hypocrisy, which merits the condemnation of the thinking people of the state.

WILL GRANT NO SPECIAL FAVORS TO CATHOLICS

PARIS, Nov. 3.—The minister of public instruction and worship, M. Briand, today announced that the government did not regard the Catholic church as being in revolt against the law providing for the separation of the church and state, or against the state.

The Catholic church having simply declined to take advantage of its provisions and the law as other religions did on December 11, would forfeit its \$80,000,000 of property and thereafter would live under the common law.

There would be neither martyrdom nor persecutions of the faithful.

The churches, as state and communal property, would remain open for Catholic worship. The object for which the Republican party in France had struggled for thirty years, the minister said, had been achieved. The concordat was at an end, the state would no longer contribute to the support of any religion, and priests would no longer enjoy privileges.

In both their duties and obligations they would be on an equality with other citizens. In other words, the state was at least neutral toward all religions and would permit the exercise of all of them with special favors to none.

NEGRO SOLDIER DIES IN A SALOON ROW

Negro soldiers of the Twenty-fifth infantry at North Bliss, five miles from here, fought in a saloon outside the reservation last night.

Private Matthews was killed and Private Lewis and Alex Johnson, a saloon keeper, were wounded.

It is said Johnson cannot live. Other troops from the fort have been dispatched to arrest the men. Advice concerning the origin of the trouble are conflicting, but a card game is said to have prompted the affair.

WIRELESS TELEPHONE AN AID TO FISHERMEN

MARSHFIELD, Mass., Nov. 3.—The wireless telephone, it is said, has successfully entered in the deep sea fishing industry.

SAUSALITO, Calif., Nov. 3.—A stormy meeting of the board of town trustees held here last night ended at 3 o'clock this morning in a fist fight between Trustee Pistolacia and Superintendent Belden of the Sausalito Purity Springs company, in which the former was severely hurt.

ELK HUNTERS KILL A GAME WARDEN

J. P. MORGAN SECURES BURNS MANUSCRIPTS

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—John P. Morgan imported yesterday what is said to be the most complete set in existence of the original manuscripts and private letters of Robert Burns, the Scottish poet.
Mr. Morgan's agents have been scouring Great Britain for the last fifteen years in order to secure the documents. An expenditure of no less than \$200,000, it is estimated, has been incurred.
It is believed to be Mr. Morgan's intention to give the Burns manuscripts and papers to the Metropolitan Museum of Art.
