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ELECTRIC CHARGE KILLS SMALL BOY

INNOCENTLY TAKES HOLD OF A LIVE WIRE

Little Girl Playmate Receives a Severe Shock While Watching the Tragic Fate of Her Companion

Forest Flannery, the 12-year-old son of James C. Flannery, 1942 1/2 South Union street, was killed almost instantly by electrocution about 11 o'clock yesterday morning, in front of 808 West Eleventh street.

The boy attempted to lift a telegraph wire that had fallen from its fastening on the poles of the Sunset Telephone company, and which impeded his passage across the street.

Kathryn Phelps, a little girl who lives in the neighborhood where the accident occurred, was standing near the injured boy and received a severe shock from the transmitted current of electricity that passed through the boy's body.
