GIVES HARRIMAN 23,000 MILES

Illinois Central Completes Ocean-to-Ocean Route

Los Angeles agents of the Illinois Central have received official news of the election of J. T. Harahan as president of that road, to succeed Stuyvesant Fish.

As a result of the New York stockholders' election it is believed that E. H. Harriman has at last realized the fulfillment of his plan to control a railroad line from the Atlantic to the Pacific ocean. In this great plan the Illinois Central was the one link missing to complete a line of track from New York to San Francisco and Portland, Ore., from the great lakes to the gulf of Mexico and from the gulf to the Pacific again.

The first important step in the direction of securing the outlet on the Atlantic seaboard of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific roads is believed to have been taken by Harriman several weeks ago when it was reported that one of the roads under his control had taken over control of the Baltimore and Ohio by the purchase of a block of 400,000 shares of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad, which was sold by the Pennsylvania Railroad company.

Taken together this system of Harriman railroads, if unified, puts under one control more than 23,000 miles of track, with a capitalization of more than \$1,700,000,000.

Harahan Says "No Changes"

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—J. T. Harahan, president of the Illinois Central railroad, said today that there would be no changes in the operating methods of the road as a consequence of his election. He added that the road would continue its present amicable relations with all connecting lines and would not prefer any of the other roads.

KRUTTSCHNITT APPROVES IT

Southern Pacific's All Metal Coach Eliminates Danger

Los Angeles officials of the Southern Pacific have heard that the all-metal coach is a success.

Several months ago the Southern Pacific built in its Sacramento yards an all-metal coach as an experiment to minimize wrecks. This has made its first trip to Chicago and returned, bringing with it the approval of Julius Kruttschnitt, director of maintenance and operation.

Railroad men now claim that the day of wooden coaches is past, and that the adoption of the steel coach by Kruttschnitt means that the new cars will be put on all lines.

This construction of an all-steel passenger coach is a departure from that of the ordinary car. The builders say that it will neither telescope nor burn. The "clear story," which is the slight elevation on the roof of all passenger cars, has been eliminated.

The underframe consists of two heavy beams running the entire length of the car and extending to the end of the platform. The floor construction is composed of steel beams, asbestos and concrete, the whole being covered with heavy linoleum.

The car is equipped with wide vestibules of the strongest possible kind, to resist telescoping.

CONSIDER PER DIEM PROBLEM

Western Lines Would Enforce Penalties to Insure Equipment

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—A meeting of the big central and western railroads, which own most of the freight cars of their country, is to be held in Chicago for the purpose of raising the per diem charged by them for the use of freight cars when on the rails of roads other than their own.

The central and western lines complain that owing to the small per diem the lesser eastern lines get possession of their cars and keep them when they are sorely needed and the per diem will be increased as a means of hastening the return of cars to their owners.

NEW YORK TO HONOLULU LINE

Twelve Vessels to Be Put in New Service

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 8.—According to the Mexican Herald the American-Hawaiian Steamship company will, in January next, commence the operation of a steamship service between New York and Honolulu in connection with the Tehuantepec National railway of Mexico. Two ships will be put into service on the route. Seven of the vessels will play between New York and Coatzacoalcas and seven between Santa Cruz, San Francisco and Honolulu. Weekly sailings will be maintained.

Abandon Horn Route

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8.—It was announced at the offices of the American-Hawaiian steamship company today that the steamer Arizona, sailing next month, would be the first vessel to inaugurate the new itinerary between this port and Salina Cruz. This new freight service contemplates the bringing of New York freight to this port via the isthmus of Tehuantepec.

The American-Hawaiian Steamship company has entered into an agreement with the Tehuantepec Mexican Railway company whereby its freight will be transferred overland from Salina Cruz on the Pacific side to Coatzacoalcas, the port on the gulf of Tehuantepec. The Arizona is now loading on Puget sound. The service around the Horn will be discontinued.

Expedite Mails in Chicago

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—The first registry transfer stations in the history of Chicago mails were opened by Postmaster Busse at the Illinois Central, Northwestern and Union railway stations. Similar stations will be operated at La Salle street, Dearborn street and Grand Central stations in the coming week. These stations will further the prompt dispatch of all registered mail matter, this being forwarded direct from one line to another without having to go through the main office as heretofore, and will relieve the congested condition of local mails, especially during the holiday season.

Switchmen Accept Offer

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—The switchmen today accepted the offer of the managers of the western roads for an increase of three cents an hour in wages. Further increase of 3 cents an hour will be determined by arbitration. The men at first demanded 5 cents increase an hour and an 8-hour day. Later they changed their request to one for an increase of 10 cents an hour.

INDICT ELEVEN IN MINNEAPOLIS

REBATE GIVING RESULTS IN TRUE BILLS

Railroads and Officials Are Found Guilty by Federal Grand Jurors, As Are Certain Milling Concerns

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 8.—Eleven indictments were handed to Judge Lochran in the United States district court this afternoon.

They cover the giving of rebates by certain railroads and the receiving of the same by grain firms and individuals.

The list of corporations against which the indictments were returned as given out by Assistant District Attorney Ewart and Dickie, who have had charge of the cases, follows:

Great Northern Railway company, four indictments and about seventy-five counts.

The Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha railway, one indictment and fifty counts.

Wisconsin Central railway, one indictment and seventeen counts.

Minneapolis & St. Louis railway, one indictment and five counts.

The indictments against the railroads charge the giving of rebates, and under the head of receiving rebates the following true bills were returned: W. P. Devereaux company, McCaull-Dinsmore company, Minneapolis & James Brooks company, Duluth, Duluth Milling company.

Besides the corporations, indictments were returned against eleven individual officials of the railroads named, but United States District Attorney Haupt said he would not consent to the names being given out for publication, owing to the fact that no service had yet been made upon them.

The general offense alleged in the railroad indictment is the absorption of grain with elevation of the charges. After the bunch of indictments had been given out to the court the jurors were excused for the term and told to convene again in St. Paul.

That a further and more searching investigation into the rebate question will be made is not denied by Assistant United States District Attorney Ewart and further revelations are expected to be made at the next sitting of the grand jury.

NON-PARTISANS OPEN CAMPAIGN

PREPARE FOR BIG MEETING TOMORROW NIGHT
Every Candidate on the City Ticket Expected to Be Present—Lee C. Gates to Make the Principal Address

Encouraged by the excellent showing made by the non-partisan county committee in Tuesday's election the non-partisan city committee is making arrangements for an aggressive campaign for the municipal election December 4.

Their opening gun of the campaign will be fired tomorrow night. Simpson auditorium has been engaged for the occasion and it is expected that the record crowd of election season will be in attendance.

James A. Foshay, chairman of the city non-partisan committee, will preside and introduce the various speakers.

All the various candidates for city offices and for councilmen are expected to be in attendance. It is not planned for all of them to make addresses, but those who do not speak will at least be introduced to the audience.

Lee C. Gates, the nominee for mayor, will make the principal address, and it is expected that in addition to the candidates several good speakers who are not candidates but who are heartily in favor of the non-partisan movement also will be on the platform and make brief remarks.

M. Lissner, secretary of the committee, said yesterday that the non-partisans proposed to make an active campaign and that it would continue from the opening on Saturday night until the night of election day, December 4.
