

SANTA FE'S HEAD PREDICTS RUSH

BIG TOURIST INFLUX BOUND FOR CALIFORNIA

Election Year Cannot Stop Prosperity That Tempts Americans to Travel—Los Angeles is Best Advertised

Third Vice President George T. Nicholson of Chicago, who has charge of the traffic interests of the Santa Fe system, said yesterday that the railroads had spent more money in advertising California than any other state or community in the country and that the travel this year will break all records.

As one of the heads of a system which cannot begin to get the locomotives, coaches and cars it needs because of enormous business and has done much to build up California, Mr. Nicholson talks as an expert.

"By the time I get back here in January I expect to see the largest movement in the history of railroading out this way," said he.

"With an election year here, fairly good weather in the east and the natural desire of most people to spend Christmas at home I do not look for the real rush west to begin until after Christmas. Then watch out.

Diverted from Florida

"Tourist business to Florida and Cuba will not fall off much in spite of the increase to Los Angeles. General prosperity also will allow those resorts their share of trade at the hands of pleasure seekers.

"The colonist business this year was entirely satisfactory. We had as big a year as ever before, however, and the business, generally speaking, was better.

Los Angeles will get 15 to 20 per cent more high-class tourist trade this winter than ever before. The tourists are starting earlier and will stay longer—the class of people who stay at your best hotels, patronize your best attractions and buy costly goods when they buy anything at all.

Business Men, Too

"Then, too, business men going east and west on business trips are increasing right along. Several things are in Los Angeles favor this season. San Francisco is more or less out of the running, because of lack of hotel facilities and because of conditions generally. On the other hand, the hotel accommodations of Los Angeles and Southern California have improved wonderfully, and they were so good before that improvement hardly seemed possible.

"It is too early to predict the size of the Shriner crowds for Los Angeles next spring, but everything points to the greatest Shriner gathering in the history of the order."

TO TRANSHIP ACROSS ISTHMUS

American-Hawaiian Line Gets in the Game Early

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Word of what is regarded as the first important step taken in anticipation of the opening of the Panama canal reached Washington this week from the City of Mexico.

According to advices the American-Hawaiian Steamship company will put in operation in January a fleet of fourteen big freight steamers between New York and San Francisco and New York and Honolulu, in connection with the Tehuantepec National railway of Mexico, which traverses the Isthmus of Tehuantepec. It is believed here that the steamships will run direct from coast to coast as soon as the Panama canal is opened, and that the company is starting this early in order to establish its business.

The fleet of fourteen ships is to be divided, seven of them plying between New York and Coatzacoalcas, and an equal number between San Francisco, Santa Cruz and Honolulu.

DANGER OF STRIKE IS AVERTED

Situation is Cleared Among New York Railroaders

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—There no longer appears to be any danger of a strike of railroad employes in the east, as the situation with reference to the demands of members of certain organizations was considerably cleared today.

The New York, New Haven & Hartford and the New York Central railroads came to an agreement with committees representing the firm of the

two roads affecting the status of the men now on the electric locomotives, and the adjustment committee of the Erie locomotive engineers announced late today it had come to an agreement with the officials of that system.

The firm's committee will confer further with the New York Central and New York, New Haven & Hartford officials concerning the questions of increased wages and shorter hours. It was said at the offices of the Erie system late today that there will be no trouble in reaching an agreement with the firm at the proper time, as President Underwood's letter to Chief Hanrahan was not a refusal to grant concessions to the dissatisfied men, but simply a request to hold off until settlements could be made with yardmen, switchmen, brakemen and other employes of the company.

It was said that when these adjustments shall have been made the demands of the firm will be taken up and those considered reasonable be granted.

RIPLEY HAS A BUSY DAY HERE

Investigates Rebate, Depot and Other Santa Fe Business

President E. P. Ripley of the Santa Fe spent a busy day in Los Angeles yesterday.

He formed one of the party of officials who inspected the new freight house now building.

President Ripley has his hands full of trouble these days. Besides the rebate inquiry in Los Angeles, the legislators of Kansas threaten to put the 2-cent-a-mile railroad rate into effect in that state, and also do other things to his big corporation.

"We can simply put in our orders for cars and rails and equipment," said he, "and wait with good grace till they are filled."

"There is just one story about business. There is so much business that no one can do business satisfactorily. The railroads cannot supply the cars that are demanded to handle the world's great commerce."

The Santa Fe executive is said to have found a good deal to interest him in the legal department, which is now wrestling with the rebate problem.

The executive was naturally disturbed over the attack on his road by United States District Attorney Oscar Lawler in the rebate inquiry.

The United States grand jury went into session at 2 o'clock, but if anything was done in the rebate matter it was without the assistance of Mr. Lawler, who is in Fresno conducting cases in the northern section of his jurisdiction.

There was considerable speculation as to whether Lawler would have summoned the high Santa Fe officials before the grand jury had he been in the city yesterday.

The special train of five cars carrying the officials goes to San Francisco today.

TESTIFIES IN KANSAS CASE

Contractor Says Burlington Construction Cost \$25,000 a Mile

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 13.—W. R. Stubbs of Lawrence, Kas., speaker of the Kansas house and a railroad contractor, testified for the state today at the hearing here of the Burlington maximum freight rate case.

He told of the cost of construction in an attempt to disprove the railroad's claim that because of high operating and maintaining expenses it would be impossible to operate with a profit under the new freight rate law.

Mr. Stubbs said it did not cost, at the very outside figure, more than \$20,000 a mile to construct the Burlington lines in Missouri. The improvements in the way of ballasting and heavier steel would be thought, being the cost of constructing the main line up to \$25,000 a mile.

PROJECTS WESTERN UTAH LINE

Senator Clarke Will Build Branch from Tintic Junction

SALT LAKE, Nov. 13.—The Tribune tomorrow will say that Senator W. A. Clark is soon to announce the projection of a branch railroad from Tintic Junction to the mines of Deep creek in Western Utah.

Construction will commence not later than January 1, 1907, and the road will be in operation within a year thereafter. It will be about seventy-five miles long and will be a feeder to the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake. The project will open up a great and rich mining region now handicapped by lack of transportation.

INDICTED UNDER REBATE STATUTE

Offenders Are Liable to Pay Big Fine and Suffer Imprisonment or Both for Violating the Law

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 13. Davis S. Kresky, a freight broker, and W. A. McGowan, local agent for the Nickel Plate fast freight line, indicted here today charged with conspiracy to violate the interstate commerce act, and Henry S. Hartley, a grain dealer, indicted on a charge of accepting rebates in freight shipments, were arrested this afternoon and arraigned before Judge Carland, sitting in the United States district court. They were released on furnishing a \$5000 bond.

The court tomorrow will set a date for their trial.

Kresky and McGowan are liable to a fine of from \$1000 to \$10,000 and imprisonment in the penitentiary for a term not exceeding two years, or both fine and imprisonment.

Hartley is liable to a fine of from \$1000 to \$20,000.


