

## SCHMITZ SAYS HE IS INNOCENT

(Continued from Page One)  
buy on the steamer he chattered freely about the case. He said he had not anticipated he would be indicted, but he said he could face his accusers without fear.  
Mayor Schmitz was asked whether he had heard the reports that there had been a reign of terror recently in San Francisco and he replied that he knew of no reign of terror and could not believe that conditions had not been exaggerated.  
"I have represented the labor people of San Francisco," he continued, "and the first time I was elected I was looked upon as a joke. This time, in spite of money used against me and damaging reports, and the people rallied to my support, and again elected me to the mayoralty."  
Refers to Earthquake  
"At the time of the earthquake, when San Francisco was in chaos, all spoke of my work, including even the newspapers which had been against me. This made my opponents desperate. They determined to move against me. This is the result. They tried to discredit the prestige which I got for doing my duty. I am not at all sorry that it has happened. I am glad it has come up, for I believe that the investigation will react against just those people who have instigated it."  
"What is your position in regard to the French restaurants?"  
"My position has never changed in the matter of these restaurants. They have each a liquor license and it is optional with the police commissioners whether they grant or refuse a license to those places. One man on the board, a Mr. Hutton, demanded that the licenses be not granted until the rooms were taken out. I protested then because such rooms had always existed and they could not be taken away without ruining the business. You have them here and it is an established condition. For this reason I took the stand that I did."  
"Now they hired Abraham Ruef, who is also my lawyer."  
Here someone broke in to inform Mr. Schmitz that it had been charged that his brother, Herbert, had an interest in a notorious resort known as the "Municipal Crib," and that further it was alleged that Herbert's interest was really the mayor's.  
"No one ever had stock of that kind for me, with or without my sanction," he replied.  
"My answer to your question is that I in no way assumed responsibility for the acts of others. I am not my brother's keeper. I say this, that I am very close to my brother and I cannot believe the story."  
Mayor Schmitz declared that all his efforts while in office had been directed toward the suppression of graft. To questions as to the possible guilt of Ruef and others who have been mentioned in the disclosures, Mayor Schmitz reiterated that he was not his brother's keeper.  
He denied having received a communication from Ruef since he went

abroad. Asked whether he considered Mr. Ruef's fee for appearing before the police commission as excessive, the mayor replied:  
"The question of Mr. Ruef's fees is not a matter for me to determine. Mr. Ruef is a man of high standing in his profession. If I knew he were dishonest I would have absolutely nothing to do with him."  
"What are your relations with Mr. Ruef?"  
"He is my attorney, that's all."  
"In view of the present trouble in San Francisco will you continue him to act as your counsel?"  
"Everything in the past justifies my faith in Mr. Ruef. I will continue to have faith in him and will not drop him as my counsel."  
Mayor Schmitz was asked if he thought Mr. Hearst may be behind the charges which had led to the returning of the indictments.  
In his reply he said that the district attorney was a candidate for governor on the ticket of the Independence league. He averred that Mr. Hearst had sent a special commissioner to see him while he was abroad to ask him to send some message to his fellow laborer in the city of New York that might be of assistance to Mr. Hearst in his campaign. The mayor declared that he had refused to do anything, in accord

with his past practice, and he would neither favor nor oppose Mr. Hearst.  
He refused to say definitely whether he believed that Mr. Hearst was at the bottom of the bringing of charges that money was sent to San Francisco for her relief after the earthquake had disappeared instead of going into the hands of the sufferers. To this he replied:  
"I had nothing to do with that. The relief money was turned over to a committee which I appointed and they are absolutely responsible for any shortage."  
Asked whether in his opinion there was "a carnival of graft" in San Francisco he replied:  
"I fought graft, and if a story was brought to me it was thoroughly investigated. I found no graft in San Francisco."  
Frederick H. Hilbert, president of the Hilbert Mercantile company of San Francisco, who accompanied Mayor Schmitz on his trip, when asked whether there was any truth in the report that it had been impossible for a saloon or restaurant keeper to get a license until he bought his liquor from the Hilbert company absolutely denied that report.  
"It is," he asserted, "dirty politics. Such a thing is not only impossible but absolutely false. I'm going back without any fear. The whole move is politics."

**PUBLISHERS' PRIVILEGES ARE TO BE CONSIDERED**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—As the result of the friction over publishers' privileges in the two countries, the Canadian government has notified this government that the postal convention between the two countries will be abrogated May 7 next.  
The notice is accompanied by a statement that it is only in so far as it relates to second class mail that this action is desired to extend, and that if by legislation or department action new regulations are framed for the guidance of the United States postoffice department regarding second class mail Canada will be prepared to enter upon negotiations for another convention relating to this class of mail.
