

NON-PARTISANS TALK TO CROWD ENTHUSIASTIC PEOPLE FILL BIG HALL

Presence of Members of Committee of One Hundred Disapproves Malicious Misstatements of Republican Leaders

With a meeting exceeding in number of spectators and in enthusiasm any political gathering which has been held in Los Angeles since the opening of the non-partisan campaign in Simpson auditorium two weeks ago, the non-partisans last night concluded the second week's journey on the road to general government.

Every seat in the hall was occupied, even the band gallery was filled, and in the rear of the hall standing room was at a premium. Many women were present, and they appeared to be as enthusiastic and as deeply interested as were the men.

Give Gates an Ovation Every sentiment expressed in favor of non-partisanship in civic affairs, the names of every candidate and the candidates themselves were cheered, but when Mr. Gates arose to speak he was given a veritable ovation.


