Southern Pacific Plans New 300-Mile Branch--Harriman Wants Control of Chicago's Big Subway.

Seeks Control of Subway and Later of Other Franchises

Reading Rejects Demands

Reading, Pa., Nov. 24--The Road-

by means of a combination of the subway, transportation, freight, express, electric light and power and telephone lines now holding franchises.

The statement was made that the proposed merger of the Illinois Tunnel company and the Chicago Edison company was the first in the formation of one of the greatest corporations the world has ever seen.

It is known that Mr. Harriman wants to gain control of the tunnels in order to use them as a distributing system for freight arriving in Chicago over the many railroads now under his control.

Such a system for the exchange and distribution of freight and express would mean a saving of millions for the Harriman roads.

Commissioner Lane declared at the conclusion of the evidence that he had desired the information for the purpose of showing that under the present law it was impossible to reach the offices of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad and two of its officers for rebating.

It was shown that no part of the bridge tolls on goods routed from Kansas City to Cincinnati and points east, or from points east of the Mississippi to Kansas City, is allotted to Missouri.

These and other facts are expected by the state to improve the chain of the railroad that it is losing money on freight in Missouri.

These funds in payment of bridges are not paid in lump sums, but in installments as the sections of work are finished. It will keep on accumulating in the treasury. The toll companies will pay their share, too.

The chief argument of the Macy street bridge adherents is that they wish to avoid the possibility of another accident such as the recent fatal one when a car nearly tumbled into the Arroyo in Los Vegas.

When he was last elected to the council Kern promised his constituents a bridge across the river at Seventh street. He put it off from time to time until the board of public works practically decided against it in favor of the Macy street bridge.

Now he insists that the city has committed itself to the Seventh street bridge and will have to build it first if his influence is worth anything. He expects to resign from the council Monday and has less than two days to get action on his fellow councilman.

"Let us wait," he said when told that the Brooklyn Heights people are insisting on their bridge immediately. "I'd like to see the city build all the bridges that are needed, but the Seventh street bridge will have to come first this time."

Retiring Councilman Declares That the Macy Street Viaduct Will Also Be Put in Place Shortly

Councilman Ed Kern says the money to build the East Seventh street concrete bridge is on hand and work can go ahead right away.

In the dying days of his career as councilman he is heading every effort to insure his precocity being carried out and his assurances from his colleagues, but it is understood, that leave no doubt of it.

"And the Macy street people will get their bridge, too," he added. "The money for that will be ready in plenty of time."

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GAS TROUBLES COME TO END SUPPLY TO BE PLENTIFUL AFTER TODAY

Shortage Caused by Lack of Storage Facilities--New Tank Will Hold Five Million Cubic Feet

A. B. Day, assistant secretary of the Los Angeles Gas and Electric company, issued the cheering statement yesterday that after today there will be no more shortage of gas and homes that depend on gas for fuel for heating will once again be warm. The change will be due to the new storage tank with a capacity of 5,000,000 cubic feet of gas, which was installed yesterday.

Last night the gas works was set in operation to fill this big tank and it is promised that by Monday there will be no more cause for complaint.

"We ordered this tank a long while ago, and according to contract it should have been delivered to us November 1," said Mr. Day yesterday, "but strikes at the steel plant and other things seem to have conspired to cause us trouble and the last straw came when the cold snap set in. If the cold weather had held off just a few days there would not have been the complaint from gas consumers that has reached our ears in a never ceasing buzz since the first cold day."

"It has been said that the mains through which we supply our gas are not large enough for the drain upon them, but this is not true. The size of the mains has little to do with the quantity of gas as it is supplied under pressure. The trouble has been that we have not had the gas to supply."

"Our plant is capable of making 11,000,000 cubic feet of gas every day, but we have had a storage tank of only 3,000,000 feet. Ordinarily this is sufficient, but it has not proved so during the last few days. We are compelled to make the gas and store it at night when the fires are turned off and the gas is not being used. We have been storing 3,000,000 cubic feet every night. With the new tank we have a total storage capacity of 8,000,000 cubic feet, which is enough to supply the heaviest demand that could be made on us."

"After Sunday there will be no trouble about shortage of gas."

A special train will bring several camps of Woodmen of the World from Redlands, San Bernardino and Riverside to Los Angeles next Monday to visit La Brea camp. Enthusiastic speeches, an initiation and a lively entertainment will be held.

An election of officers will occur early in the evening. Four men who have been recently elected to office will be considered a reception. They are Mark Koppel, who was elected county superintendent of schools; Don J. P. Treadwell and Don E. H. Pierce, elected to the state legislature, and Albert Lee Stevens, elected county treasurer. La Brea camp has been making great preparations for the visit.

INDIAN CHIEF HELD FOR COMRADE'S DEATH

Special to The Herald. FRIGGS FALLS, Minn., Nov. 24--Big Bird, an Indian of the old type, is in the county jail here on the charges of slaying the throat of Aysquahlow, a fellow Indian, near Island lake, on the Red Lake reservation, several weeks ago.

When arrested for the crime Big Bird strenuously denied that he had taken liquor upon the reservation, supposing that was his offense, but he cheerfully admitted having cut him for death, apparently thinking that a matter of little consequence.

A United States marshal who was down from the reservation this week says that Aysquahlow was steadily sinking, and the attending physician has given up hopes of his recovery. He is the fourth man Big Bird is said to have slain, and his assailant is likely to spend his remaining days in prison.

CONDEMNNS METHODS OF SAN FRANCISCAN EMPLOYERS' ASSOCIATION NOT WANTED IN LOS ANGELES

The methods used by L. T. Mayhew of San Francisco to organize an Employers' association in Los Angeles has received the condemnation of the Merchants and Manufacturers' association. The sentiments of the Merchants and Manufacturers' association were expressed in no uncertain terms by resolutions passed by the board of directors yesterday. These resolutions are as follows:

Whereas, an effort is now being made by L. T. Mayhew, who is the personal representative of Herbert George of the San Francisco Citizens' alliance, to organize an Employers' association in this city, and in so doing is using unfair methods and violation of the work accomplished and of the objects of this association; and

Whereas, in our opinion no necessity exists for a new organization, and its establishment would only increase the mercantile and industrial interests; and

Whereas, the Merchants and Manufacturers' association has always successfully combated unjust demands, strikes, and boycotts and has been a prominent factor in maintaining industrial peace and freedom for Los Angeles, as no other city can boast of; therefore be it

Resolved, By the board of directors of the Merchants and Manufacturers' association, that we strongly disapprove and condemn any attempt on the part of outsiders to organize an association for which there is no necessity or demand, and be it further

Resolved, That we point with pride to the success of our work and that we will allow no interference in our local affairs by Herbert George of San Francisco or any other outsider, the Merchants and Manufacturers' association and other organized bodies having proven that it is fully able to cope with any industrial disturbance that may arise in this city, and we hereby urge our members to discontinue any effort of outsiders to injure themselves in our local affairs.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS RETURN

Meeting to Discuss World's Fair Will Be Held the First of the Week

With this prospect the promoters of the exposition are planning a vigorous campaign in behalf of the project as soon as the chamber of commerce takes definite action.

BUILDING AGENTS BECOME ANXIOUS

FEAR TROUBLE FROM BUCKET SHOP CRUSADE

Law Declares Those Who Provide Quarters for Gamblers Are Accomplices and Provides Severe Penalty if Convicted

Anxiety was evident on the part of a number of office building agents yesterday, following the raid made upon the alleged bucket shop of C. B. Denison in the Citizens National Bank building Friday, at which time Denison and two of his associates, Hiles and Scott, were arrested. This action brought about the announcement from the city prosecuting attorney's office that all office building owners and agents will be arrested following the conviction of those guilty of carrying on the illegal speculation business.

The California laws regarding gambling make the man who rents quarters to a gambler his accomplice, and provides a penalty for his participation in the offense. Therefore, the office building proprietors and agents who rent space to "brokers" of rather questionable methods are feeling very uneasy just now, as heavy fines are often levied even in the police court.

Deputy Prosecuting Attorney George Beebe stated that no warrants will be issued unless the men now arrested are convicted of violating the law against gambling. In that case he said the Citizens National Bank building people will be placed under arrest, and that the matter will be carried to the extent of ferreting out all illegal speculators and arresting them, together with the proprietor or agent of the building in which their offices are located.

Hiles and Scott have furnished bonds for their appearance in Police Judge Austin's court, and their trial will be held November 27.

HEAVY FROST IS PREDICTED

Forecaster Says the Weather Will Continue to Be Chilly Around the Edges

A heavy frost yesterday morning verified the prediction of Weather Forecaster Walliker, and if the predictions of last night come true still more frost can be looked for. The forecast is that this morning's frost will not be so heavy as those of the previous days. Toward the east the cold snap was more severe than in this city, and the frost was heavier.

Tender vegetables, flowers and shrubbery have been seriously injured by the past few days' frosts, the Glendale, Eagle Rock and Whittier districts suffering the heaviest damage.

The forecast for today is: "Heavy frost Sunday morning and fair during the day."
