

## ACTIVE CAMPAIGN NEAR A CLOSE

### NON-PARTISANS TO END WORK TOMORROW NIGHT

Big Meetings to Be Held in Simpson Auditorium and Blanchard Hall

—Very Confident of Victory

Grand close of campaign, with principal meetings at Simpson Auditorium and at Blanchard hall, both of which will be addressed by Mr. Gates and other non-partisans on the non-partisan ticket.

Two more days and the great campaign which has been waged by the non-partisans in behalf of clean, honest city government will have ended.

Today will be an active one, and the campaign will come to a close with two big meetings tomorrow night.

Monday night there will be scores of

precinct meetings, but the campaign which has been conducted by the non-partisan committee virtually will cease with the climax planned for Simpson Auditorium and Blanchard hall.

These meetings will be held at the same hour, and each will be addressed by Mr. Gates and various other non-partisans. Mr. Gates' first speech will be delivered at Simpson Auditorium. While this is in progress other speakers will entertain the audience at Blanchard hall, and they will go from there to Simpson Auditorium when Mr. Gates arrives at Blanchard hall.

### Non-Partisans Are Happy

An air of confidence pervades the headquarters of the non-partisan committee as a result of developments which show beyond a question of doubt that success awaits the non-partisan movement next Tuesday.

Many well-meaning citizens have been waiting to see which candidate for mayor, Gates, Lindley or Harper, developed the greatest strength before deciding whom they would support on election day. These doubtful voters need have no further hesitation after the statement made in the evening organ supporting Dr. Lindley.

Much was claimed as the result of a return postal card sent to every voter in the city in behalf of Dr. Lindley, which requested voters to sign their names on the return portion of the card pledging themselves to vote for Dr. Lindley. According to the evening paper only 4900 names have been received out of over 50,000 cards sent out.

### Favor Non-Partisans

The non-partisans had received up to Wednesday night 3076 replies to a similar request sent out on behalf of Mr. Gates, and the non-partisan ticket. Two hundred and eleven replies were received Tuesday and they are coming in by the hundred every day. Undoubtedly by election day at least 10,000 favorable replies will be on file at the non-partisan headquarters, but even this will not represent the entire non-partisan strength, because there are many who do not wish to commit themselves in writing over their signatures, to say nothing of the thousands who, through negligence, fail to fill out and mail a reply.

Every indication points to an overwhelming non-partisan success. The non-partisan managers are holding themselves in check lest they become overenthusiastic.

### Overwhelming for Gates

The result of straw ballots taken in every part of the city was so unambiguously encouraging and overwhelmingly favorable to the non-partisan cause that in order to satisfy themselves the non-partisan managers decided to take on their own account a straw vote among the occupants of the big Douglas

office building, in which the non-partisan headquarters are located and which also contains the offices of some of the staunchest supporters of Dr. Lindley. The result of that canvass was as follows: For Gates 80, for Lindley 33, for Harper 17, for Wilson 2, for Phillips 1; doubtful 13.

This result tallies with the returns received from straw votes taken in perhaps fifty different parts of the city and from the results shown by the canvasses made by the non-partisan precinct committeemen. The latest piece of news received at the non-partisan headquarters was that in a very large department store in the city employing several hundred voters from 90 to 95 per cent of the voters were favorable to Gates.

Everything points to a stampede for the non-partisan ticket, and undoubtedly the several thousand doubtful votes which have been waiting for a test of strength will go in the same direction.

### MR. GATES ADDRESSES TWO GOOD MEETINGS THANKSGIVING NIGHT

Lee C. Gates and other non-partisan nominees and adherents yesterday gave thanks in advance for the victory which they feel confident of attaining next Tuesday.

Mr. Gates remained at home with his family a greater portion of the day, but in the evening he addressed two well attended meetings.

The first meeting was held in Banker's hall, at Jefferson and Normandie, where the speakers, in addition to Mr. Gates, were Leslie Hewitt and Lamar Harris, and the second was in Odd Fellows' hall, Wesley and Jefferson, where Leslie Hewitt and A. C. Moody spoke previously to the arrival of Mr. Gates.

Support of the non-partisan ticket was asked by Mr. Gates from a business point of view. Mr. Gates declared that in local affairs there is no place for party politics, and that the question is the securing of the best men available for the various offices. He said that the government of the city was a business affair and that only men who are capable of handling the affairs of the city economically and judiciously should be chosen.

Mr. Gates said the non-partisan movement was instituted for the express purpose of selecting, regardless of party politics, men who are best fitted for the positions to be filled. Honesty and capability were the only tests applied, with the result that the non-partisan ticket, as a whole, is the best ever presented for the suffrage of the voters of any city in the country.

He spoke particularly of the council, and in turn he praised the various

nominations made for the council by the non-partisan committee. He said that with these men representing the various wards of the city there would be no danger of another river-bed franchise steal or any similar act on the part of the council against the interests of the city.

Discussing the Owens river project Mr. Gates said: "The great Owens river water proposition must be handled by the right men. Owens river water in Los Angeles means clean streets, the laying of this frightful dust in our own ward, a plentiful supply of water for your homes and for your lawns and flower gardens; it means electrical power that will make for more and cheaper and better electric lights for use by the people; it means that Los Angeles may become more than ever the most beautiful city in America, as already she has no superior under the sun, and that the city will extend from the mountains to the sea.

"It means all of that if the great Owens river water plan is handled by the right men, but if you put corrupt men in the city council or other offices, it means electrical power that will be squandered—will be lost—and you will have to foot the bill.

"Los Angeles city should own this water system—always. It should own the time is coming when Los Angeles will have a population of 1,000,000 souls. It will be the Paris of America.

"Already the evidence is before us. The recent annexation election will be followed by annexation of San Pedro—not that we want to swallow up the little city, but there is a great harbor there that the government and the people have builded, and which has been gradually encroached upon and seized by two big corporations until little of it remains for public use. Los Angeles must take it and hold it for the whole people before these corporations shut the people out altogether. We want enough space there so that if another railroad seeks entrance there will be room for its tracks and for wharfage."

Mr. Gates' remarks aroused the greatest enthusiasm.

## TO CAN FISH CAUGHT IN SOUTHERN WATERS

### BIG CONCERN LOCATES AT SAN DIEGO

That the Canning Industry Can Be Successfully Conducted Along the Southern Coast Is Laid to Have Been Satisfactorily Demonstrated

Can fish caught in Southern California waters be successfully canned? This question, which has been asked many times by professional cannery and managers of fisheries, has been answered in the affirmative by D. E. Hume, the father of the canning business in the northwest and a nephew of the first canner of the United States.

As a result there has been organized a corporation with a capital stock of \$1,000,000, which will have its main factory at San Diego and will operate all along the coast between San Diego and Santa Barbara.

John H. Hughes, the millionaire of Fairbanks, Alaska, an associated in mining with John A. Sizerleton of Los Angeles, is president of the company, which includes, besides Mr. Hughes and Mr. Hume, John F. Forward, county recorder of San Diego county; E. B. Dodge, former city treasurer of San Diego; George H. Clark, the Imperial valley cattle king; Col. John Berry, the San Diego capitalist, and A. E. Cronenwell, the well known Monrovia capitalist.

The company has just secured a lease of 850 feet along the harbor front at San Diego and it once will begin the erection of a factory to cost \$75,000. It is the intention not only to can all manner of edible fish, but to manufacture all kinds of by-products, including oils and fertilizer. In the manufacture of the latter there will be utilized not only the refuse from edible fish, but sharks, stingrays and other fish not used as food.

During the past six months Mr. Hume has been operating a small plant at San Diego more as a demonstrating affair than otherwise, but in the meantime has accumulated quite a stock of canned fish, for which orders now are being received from the east and central west.

It is the intention of the company to acquire fishing concerns at all points between San Diego and Santa Barbara, or erect plants of its own.
