BY ED MORIARTY... It will be interesting to note whether Ascot park judges give forth any opinion after investigating the bookmaker's sheets which were called in when Remember won yesterday afternoon.

A well known local plunger, whose activities have caused speculation since Ascot opened for the present season, went about the ring yesterday, and when Remember came home somebody had been laddly scorching. The plunger play on Remember indicated an ace in the hole.

This is not the first evil-appearing finish at Ascot, where a number of queer seances have been in order, and the official ax may fly shortly. While the present investigation is on it might not be a bad plan to call in sheets descriptive of betting on La Gloria's last two races, which horse sports the silk of Bookmaker Atkins.

Races Appear Queer... La Gloria, as a heavily backed public choice, ran a brace of disappointing races while carrying a top-heavy weight of popular support. The horse, it is alleged, belongs to R. D. Williams and is trained by him, while R. I. Miller stands as titular trainer.

A very poor chance indeed does the public stand while flirting with the property of bookmakers, whether the cause of the Labor party in Newcastle. An owner directs his jockeys and disastrous results may ensue.

The horses belonging to Williams are not allowed stable room at any other track in the country, and what is not good enough for foreign places does not go well in Los Angeles. It appears as though, with Ascot life closing, a stack of hay is being piled in the sunshine, and the judges, it is hoped, will stamp out the evil.

A horse owner should be absolutely barred from booking on a track which his property is running. A pleasing feature of the Baldwin Racing association's promises is that no undesirable owners or bookmakers will be allowed to control jockeys or race horses. As a result clean sport should come.

SUSPEND JOCKEYS AT NEW ORLEANS

RIDERS HAVE STORMY RACING SESSION... Aubuchon Caught in Jam and Face is Painfully Lacerated—Jockey Perrett Strikes St. Valentine with Whip

By Associated Press. NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 2.—Two jockeys suspended, one painfully injured and bets declared off on one race suspended the features of today's racing at the Orleans grounds. In the first race Jockey Aubuchon, riding Sir Vagrant, was unseated, being caught in a jam and having his face painfully lacerated before going down. In consequence of this accident Aubuchon's mount in the third race, Gold Mate, was scratched and bets declared off.

Jockey Perrett, riding Florizel in the fourth race, was suspended for the remainder of this meeting and fined \$50 for striking St. Valentine with his whip. In the fifth race Jockey Seder, riding Billy Vertrees, was suspended for the remainder of this meeting for cutting across the field.

CANNOT DANCE; GETS \$3000... Village Belle Gets Damages from Railroad Because of Odd Accident to Her

LA CROSSE, Wis., Jan. 2.—The victim of a peculiar accident two years ago, which has incapacitated her from indulging in her favorite amusement that of dancing, caused Miss Lettie May Rowley, the belle of the village of Mather, to bring suit for damages against the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad company. Miss Rowley was walking along the depot platform when a fast freight went thundering by. The jarring of the platform caused a heavy truck to start down the incline and bump into the freight train with sufficient force to hurl it backward toward the depot. The truck struck Miss Rowley and carried her over a stove which was standing on the platform, causing injuries to her knees which has resulted in synovitis.

The jury finding a depot platform was a public nuisance and that the company did not take proper precautions to keep it safe for pedestrians awarded Miss Rowley the sum of \$3000. Attorneys for the Milwaukee road announce they will make a motion for a new trial.

LUXURIES ARE CUT OFF FROM HOBOES IN JAIL... Special to The Herald. CHAMBERSBURG, Pa., Jan. 2.—There are to be no more comforts for tramps in Franklin county. This edict went forth today, when the grand jury reported to Judge Gilliam that the thirty-six tramps in the county jail were not wholly subsisting on county fare, but that they were permitted to buy provisions from town grocers and make themselves comfortable.

The grand jury recommends that they sleep on the floor; that they be prohibited from playing games; that all articles be taken from them when they are committed; that they be not permitted to buy or have tobacco in the jail—in other words, that prison life be made as distasteful to them as possible.

If the sheriff fails to carry out the recommendations of the grand jury and the matter is brought to the attention of the court, it is recommended that the court reduce the per diem allowance for their maintenance to such a figure as the court sees fit.
