TUGGAL ELECTION CONSOLIDATION

COUNCIL TO HOLD SESSION TOMORROW Further Delay in Effecting the Merging of Los Angeles and San Pedro Is Considered Unwise

After a delay of a week and a half, which has been very exasperating to the members of the city and county consolidation commission...

President Butler said he would have no objection to holding the election on a Saturday, but he laughingly said that inasmuch as that particular Saturday was the 23d of the month it might be well to avoid the hoodoo and set the date for Monday, February 25.

Opposition Hard at Work Opponents in San Pedro of the consolidation plan have been taking advantage of the delay in the calling of the election to work against the proposition.

An example of this is the passage by the board of trustees of San Pedro of a resolution protesting against the consolidation of Los Angeles and San Pedro without the consent of the voters of the harbor city.

They professed to believe that Los Angeles was hatching a scheme to have passed by the legislature an act permitting the consolidation of cities without the consent of the voters of the cities involved.

Such a proposition never has been discussed by members of the consolidation commission or by any one else of importance, so far as has been discovered. It is said that the trustees of San Pedro were fully aware of this fact, but that they passed the resolution merely in hope of creating a sentiment against Los Angeles and the consolidation plan.

Opponents of consolidation also are circulating the report in San Pedro that the reason haste is being urged to hold the consolidation election is a desire on the part of Los Angeles to effect the consolidation in time for the tax assessment, March 4, as Los Angeles needs the San Pedro tax on account of a deficit in the Los Angeles treasury.

Say Delay Is Aggravating L. Hanson, the leader of the consolidation movement in San Pedro, came to Los Angeles yesterday, and after holding a conference with President Butler of the council, attended the session of the council.

Mr. Hanson confirmed the report that the opposition was taking every advantage possible offered by the delay in calling the election, and that while they would not succeed in turning the sentiment against consolidation their work would have a tendency to create a doubt in the minds of some as to the advisability of consolidation.

Powerful interests said Mr. Hanson, are fighting consolidation, and that the delay, if not dangerous, is extremely aggravating to the people who have made the fight against great odds for consolidation.

He expressed the confident belief, however, that nothing would transpire between now and the date of holding the election, providing the date is not too far off, to prevent consolidation, which, he says, the great majority of the citizens of San Pedro now realize is to their best advantage.


