The doctor is a thriving young eye, ear, nose and throat specialist with an office in the Holman building. Friday there appeared in two of the evening papers the announcement of the engagement of Dr. Oswald M. Justice and Miss Metegan of St. Paul, Minn.

The doctor says the communication was sent to the papers anonymously and that there is no truth in it. He is not at all pleased and says he is going to consult a lawyer. All day yesterday he was kept busy answering telephone calls, some congratulatory and others—well, the doctor does not say anything about the others, but it is rumored he had to do a deal of explaining, for he is popular with the fair sex.

Dr. Justice came to Los Angeles about four years ago from Minneapolis, where he was practicing. He is a graduate of the Minnesota university and has a great many friends in various parts of the east. One morning these friends and the doctor himself were shocked to learn from the papers that he had committed suicide.
