MURDER RESULTS FROM LONG STANDING HATRED

Mexicans Meet on North Main Street, One Armed with a Knife and the Other with a Revolver

Charged with the murder of a man supposed to be A. T. Fraimer, a Mexican, on North Main and Arcadia streets about 5:30 last night Francisco J. Estrada, proprietor of the tailor shop at 313 North Main street, was arrested by Patrolman Oker a few minutes after Fraimer was shot and is locked in the city jail.

Angry Words in Saloon

Later in the day the men are said to have met again in a saloon. At that time angry words passed, but friends restrained the men from coming to blows.

Two Bullets Effective

Three shots were fired, the first two taking effect. The first shot struck Fraimer in the left hand, while the third buried itself in his back just below the left shoulder blade.

Check Reveals Identity

None of those who witnessed the shooting would admit knowing the dead man, but when his body was taken to the city jail, the coroner was notified and Fraimer's body was removed to Pierce Brothers' undertaking establishment.

Peddler Arrested

Joseph Fares, a Greek peddler, was arrested yesterday afternoon charged with violating the license ordinance. The man is said to have traveled from house to house exhibiting numerous articles which he offered for sale.

POLYS CAPTURE TRACK HOOBOS LOCAL TEAMWINS CLAREMONT FIELD DAY

Pomona College Students Engineer Most Successful Interscholastic Event of Southern Calif. via Athletic History

Special to The Herald. POMONA, March 16.—The most successful interscholastic track meet in the history of Southern California athletics was pulled off on alumni field today under the auspices of the associated students of Pomona college.

The weather was ideal, the track in the best of condition and all the athletes in fine fettle, thus making it a day of genuine pleasure to the 1000 lovers of sport who flocked to Claremont to witness the meet.

Of the twelve events run off four Southern California records went to pieces under the enormous strain and two were equaled.

At the outset Polytechnic began the point taking business and kept it up throughout, winning the meet with a score of 32 points. Poly's most dangerous rival was Santa Paula, which sent down a team that piled up 27 points and finished second in the race.

Harvard was all to the good when it came to the relay and won both first and second places in the amazing time of 3:32 4-5, which lowers the Southern California record 10 seconds. Cline, Cray, Lee and Brown were the runners on the winning team. Everything progressed smoothly and by 5:15 p. m. all the medals and two banners had been awarded by Miss Pearl Smith and Miss Martha Gove of the junior class in the college.

In the final heat of the 100-yard dash Cover of Polytechnic lowered the record by going inches better with the metal ball. Steele of Santa Paula also tied Cline's record in the low hurdles.

DAWSON'S SANITY TO BE QUESTIONED

BELIEVE HOEGEE MANAGER IS MENTALLY DERANGED

Does Not Remember Writing Letter to District Attorney, Though Apparently His Personal Typewriter Was Used

Claims that Douglas Dawson, former manager of the William H. Hoegge company, arrested Wednesday charged with the theft of \$1700 of the firm's money, is insane are advanced by his friends, and it is probable Dawson will be surrendered by his bondsmen so an insanity commission can immediately inquire into his mental condition.

Dawson was released from jail Friday under \$5000 bonds, which were deposited by five friends. According to statements made by Dawson soon after his arrest he was the victim of a conspiracy and many of his friends believe that imaginary troubles have caused him to become demented.

Anonymous Letter Clew

It was learned yesterday that information in regard to the location of Dawson's overcoat, which was found locked in a suit case with the stolen money in the check room of the Jonathan club, was given to the district attorney by means of a typewritten letter which told him where to have the detectives search.

The letter was signed "A Conscious Stricken man," and according to the police Dawson knew nothing of its having been written or mailed. They say the letter was written on a typewriter owned by Dawson and kept in his house, but it is probable some person who knew his secret and thought that by telling the officers where the money could be found decided to write the letter.

Two of the letters made by the typewriter had peculiar defects corresponding to defects on the type on the machine owned by Dawson, and it was by this the officers established the fact that the letter was written at the Dawson home.

Dawson is now under charge of Dr. Ernerald, an expert on mental and nervous diseases. The physician will attend him until his trial and it is thought will prove a strong witness for the defense at that time.

Many of Dawson's friends do not believe him guilty of the theft of the money and constant inquiries are being made at his house in regard to his health.

All the goods which were recovered from the Dawson home by the detectives and which were identified by the Hartmann brothers as having been taken from the Hoegge establishment, are being held by Captain of Detectives Paul Flammer. Dawson claims he can produce receipts for almost all the articles and says he can prove he obtained the remainder in an honest way.

WILL PROCEED AGAINST M'CARTHY

Euclid Terrace Property Owners Took Decisive Action at Last Night's Indignation Meeting

Euclid Terrace property owners held another indignation meeting last night at the Presbyterian church, at Euclid and Stephenson avenues, to agree upon a course of procedure with respect to the refusal of the Pioneer Investment and Trust company to pay the street assessment on Stephenson avenue.

After lengthy and vigorous discussion it was decided to proceed, if possible, both civilly and criminally against President J. Harvey McCarthy of the Pioneer company.



It was also determined to employ a lawyer to proceed civilly against Mr. McCarthy and the Pioneer Investment company, to compel the payment of the bond now due for the Stephenson avenue work.

Two Must Face A Charge of Peonage By Associated Press. NEW YORK, March 16.—Edward J. Trisley, head of the labor department of the Florida and Coast railway, and Francisco Habbia, an employment agent of this city, were arraigned before a United States commissioner today charged with peonage in the employment of men for work on the extension of the railway from Miami to Key West.

They were held on bail for trial on indictments found by the United States grand jury, charging them with persuading several men to go to Florida with the intent that they should be held there as slaves.
