SEATTLE PEOPLE DON'T MIND RAIN

SEE THE SIGHTS IN SPITE OF SHOWERS

Like Southern California, Especially Los Angeles—Will Visit Pasadena and Mount Lowe Today

Eighty residents of Seattle, representing the Seattle Commercial club, who have come to Los Angeles for the purpose of seeing pointers on how to run a progressive city, paddled around in the rain yesterday and expressed themselves as being perfectly delighted with the climate of Southern California.

Puget Sound people do not deny that they are first cousins to the wet-footed of Oregon, and they said they might become homesick if they were not drenched once or twice during their stay.

Undaunted by the weather they terminated a shower, and the excursionists yesterday boarded special coaches on the Los Angeles-Pacific electric road and went to Santa Monica, Ocean Park and Venice by way of Hollywood.

They returned to Los Angeles in time for dinner, and many of them last night patronized various opera houses.

Without exception the visitors expressed themselves highly pleased with what they have thus far seen of Southern California in general and Los Angeles in particular. They have only one complaint to make, and that is the fact that Secretary Frank Wiggins of the Los Angeles chamber of commerce is not at home instead of being on his way home with the excursion party to Honolulu.

Many of the visitors are personally acquainted with Mr. Wiggins, and all know him by reputation as the secretary of the greatest chamber of commerce in the United States, and they do not consider their visit will be complete without meeting him.

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There will be music and refreshments, and words of welcome will be spoken by Gall B. Johnson, John G. Mott and Judge Waldo M. York, to which replies will be made by orators yet to be selected from among the excursionists.

S. A. Butler, chairman of the reception committee, yesterday expressed the hope that the members of the chamber will turn out in force to greet the guests from Seattle.

Thursday the Southern Pacific will give the visitors a complimentary excursion over the inside track through the orange groves. Thereafter the party will break up, and while some will return home at once, many will remain in or around Los Angeles for two or three weeks, and perhaps longer.

HANLEY WANTS BOOKS EXPERTED Former Inspector of Public Works and Successor Ask Council to Authorize Auditor to Go Over Accounts

Shortly before the expiration of the term of James Hanley, inspector of public works, he requested that the books and accounts in his office be examined by an expert accountant.

This work has not yet been done, and the board of works indorses the suggestion made by the then inspector of public works, which is also in accordance with the wishes of the present inspector of public works, D. K. Edwards.

The board yesterday recommended to the council that it instruct the city auditor to make such an examination of the books and records of that office as will thoroughly check up all the accounts of that office, or to designate some other accountant to do this work.

COUNCIL GRANTS BOARD ANOTHER STENOGRAPHER The work of the board of public works has increased so much owing to the expansion of the bureau of the Los Angeles aqueduct and construction of the outfall sewer by the city engineer, as well as the increase of routine work coming through this department, that one stenographer is unable even by working overtime to do all the work.

The board reports that it is absolutely necessary in order for the department to properly conduct its work that the council provide for an assistant stenographer at \$75 per month. This was concurred in.
