Former Convict In Toils Again is Accused of Having Bought Tools Believed to Have Been Stolen by Carpenter Held on Suspicion

A. J. Matuzenski, said to be a former convict, is in jail charged with receiving stolen property. It is said by the police the man has bought property from Charles Ross, a carpenter...

Detectives Hosick and Ziegler, who have been working on the case, found Ross had sold tools to Matuzenski. Ziegler visited Ross' room at 810 Los Angeles street yesterday and discovered a quantity of carpenter's tools...

The detectives then went to the home of Matuzenski at Tenth and El Molino streets. Two sets of surveyors' instruments and some carpenter's tools were found hidden in a lounge. Matuzenski was arrested and will be charged with buying stolen property.

In searching the house for a second one, Detective Ziegler found a few more tools, and a violin, which is thought to be a very valuable instrument. It is marked a Maggini, dated 1866.

Matuzenski is said to have served a term in the penitentiary for having taught young boys to steal and buying the stolen goods from them. Since his return from the prison several years ago the police claim Matuzenski has been buying property which was not honestly acquired.

\$60,000 BRIDGE FOR DEATH DIP

TRIANGULAR LOT IS NEEDED ON RIGHT OF WAY King's Highway Improvement Association Helps Movement to Install Modern Viaduct at Death Dip

Only one obstacle remains for the actual work on the proposed death dip \$60,000 concrete bridge to begin—the acquisition of a triangular lot at the southeast corner of Pennsylvania and Brooklyn avenues.

So far the right of way has been obtained, but this little parcel needs to be taken in to carry out the plans. The car lines need this strip for approaches to the bridge.

The board of public works yesterday considered the question and it was decided that the quickest way would be to refer the problem to the King's Highway Improvement association. It is thought this association can bring negotiations to a quick conclusion in the interest of the community, whereas condemnation proceedings would delay matters indefinitely.

At this point the city and the trolley people expect to build a new modern bridge, sharing the cost jointly, as soon as the property owners arrange the right of way difficulties. The valley is known as de los Posos and will be used by the new Covina and direct Pasadena cars, which will pass under the bridge.

CAR MOUNTS HUB OF HEAVY WAGON

Sticks Fast to Wheel and Falls to the Rails with a Jolt When the Wagon is Pulled from Under

In a "side-swiping" collision between Hollywood car No. 209 and a wagon heavily loaded with steel rails at Golden Gate avenue yesterday afternoon the front of the car was badly damaged and a number of passengers narrowly escaped serious injuries.

The collision was the most peculiar that has been recorded in the many street car accidents that have happened in Los Angeles and vicinity.

The car was running fast. The wagon was being driven slowly, close to the rails. Although the motorman applied the brakes when he saw the collision was inevitable the front steps of the car mounted the hub of a rear wheel of the wagon and, passing on, mounted the hub of the front wheel, where it stuck. The driver turned the mules attached to the wagon sharply at right angles from the car and they strained with all their might, wrenching the wheel from under the car steps. The car settled back on the track with a jolt that broke the glass and splintered much of the framework.


Several officers who were present sprang to the patrolman's assistance and carried the woman to the city jail, where she was placed in the insane ward.


